### Rites of Election set for RCIA participants

Bishop Matthew H. Clark plans to celebrate four Rites of Election next month with candidates and catechumens who are participating in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA).

During each rite, the bishop will elect catechumens, who have not been previously baptized, and will affirm candidates who have been baptized in another Christian tradition and are seeking full communion in

the Roman Catholic Church.

Rites of Election are scheduled for the following locations and dates: St. Patrick's, Corning, March 8, 4 p.m.; St. Francis DeSales, Geneva, March 11, 7:30 p.m.; Sacred Heart Cathedral, March 13, 7:30 p.m., and March 14, noon.

Bishop Clark has also invited adult confirmation candidates to an afternoon of prayer and reflection on Saturday, March 28,

at 2 p.m. in Sacred Heart Cathedral.

All parishes using the RCIA process are encouraged to send participants to one of the celebrations. Bishop Clark has asked that parishes plan a ceremony of affirmation at Sunday Mass before the Rite of Election.

Sponsors, family members and friends of the candidates and catechumens, as well as parishioners who have participated in their formation, are also invited to attend the Rites of Election. Receptions will follow each celebration.
