Opportunities for spiritual growth outlined during recent Hornell talk

Sister Mary Augustine Malley recently outlined a number of ways for people of different creeds and cultures to achieve a more just and caring society. Speaking at the January meeting of Church Women United at Arkport Presbyterian Church, Sister Augustine addressed the topic of "Piecing Together to Make a World that is Whole."

Sister Augustine, director of the pastoral care department at St. James Mercy Hospital in Hornell, was principal speaker at the luncheon meeting, which was attended by representatives of churches in Hornell and surrounding communities.

"In order that a whole be made, it is not necessary that the parts be made uniform," said Sister Augustine. "For example, consider the various elements within a mosaic, an heirloom quilt or even gingerbread. Certainly the end products are satisfyingly different from the components."

Individuals today, Sister Augustine continued, are a combination of physical, psychological and spiritual qualities. "Some people tend to be pessimistic when they consider that these individuals make up a world filled with sorrow and evils," she added. "While recognizing that these exist and not wishing to play Pollanna, I feel we have come a long way."

The longevity of contemporary Americans indicates that we are the healthiest people who have ever existed, said Sister Augustine. Children born today have a life expectancy of nearly 90 years, and, while many senior citizens reside in nursing homes, more than 70 percent of elderly people still live in their own homes or apartments.

"We are learning not to smoke, to eat correctly and to exercise," she observed. "People are physically able to travel and be independent in their 80s and 90s."

The psychological picture for modern society is also improving, according to Sister Augustine. "Admitting that there are terrible stresses in families and in our world, there is progress," she affirmed. "There hasn't been

a global war for more than 30 years, and we are working against social injustice in our own country and in South Africa. We have resources for alcoholics, the mentally ill and the family in trouble."

Outlining the opportunities now available for spiritual growth, Sister Augustine emphasized advances in ecumenism evidenced by such organizations as Church Women United, wherein people of different faiths pray, socialize and work together for the common good.

"Even the media are becoming aware of the interest in the spiritual," said Sister Augustine. She cited as examples the films, *Mother Teresa*, based on the life of the famous sister who has devoted her life to caring for the poorest of the poor, and *Therese*, the story of 'The Little Flower,' "who did ordinary things extraordinarily well for the love of Jesus," in Sister Augustine's words.

"Another example of spiritual strength shines through the achievements of Corazon Aquino, who reluctantly gave up her role as housewife and mother to head the Philippine government," said Sister Augustine. Aquino attributes her success as a world leader to her dependence on God for guidance and strength, the St. James Mercy administrator added. "Time magazine recognized these qualities by naming her 'Women of the Year.'"

"We are women whose lives may not be portrayed in the media, but we are women of faith," Sister Augustine concluded. "We believe in God, who loves us all. We listen to His voice and use the power within us to change the world — at least our world."

After Sister Augustine's speech, Anna Clark, president of the local branch of Church Women United, announced that the group's 1986 project of sending health kits and school kits to those in need through Church World Service will be continued this year, as will the blanket fund, the food pantry and the Garb Center, all CWU projects.
