men - who remained at the refugee center last Friday are being fed and clothed through donations from an ecumenical group of churches and religious organizations.

At present, arrivals have leveled off. But even on a "quiet" afternoon last Friday, the refugee center was bursting at the seams with music, conversation and

In the living room, a television crew taped interviews with several men staying at the center. A carload of refugees trooped in for a medical check-up. Moments later, two seminarians arrived. looking for five men who will be moving to Christ the King Seminary in Amherst, where they will stay until their hearing date.

As several women prepared a late lunch in the kitchen, a new arrival — the first of the day — walked through on his way to the center's office, where two phones rang intermittently.

A couple of women on their first visit to the center stood by, watching veteran volunteer Brigid Murphy in action, an-

swering phones, taking deliveries and fielding questions.

Most of the travelers originally came from El Salvador and Guatemala, according to Murphy. But she has also welcomed Chileans, Mexicans, Sri Lankans and even an Iranian family.

In general, the refugees are people from whose lives all certainty has been stripped away. Thus, many of them are fearful about what will happen next, even though Canadian immigration officials have assured them that they are likely to be accepted immediately after their hearings. take place. In the meantime, the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Services (INS) has issued the refugees temporary permits to remain in the United States.

Canadian officials have told Sister Butler that they expect to propose new immigration legislation later this month. She believes the number of refugees who will continue trying to cross the border will depend on how fast the word spreads throughout the refugee community.

"It's a very erratic situation," she explained. "What happens will really depend on whether people begin to realize that the border is still open and start coming again."

Sister Butler has contacted several Rochester church organizations, including Genesee Ecumenical Ministries and the Rochester Sanctuary Committee, to ask for their support.
