Parish aids Haitian poor and sick

St. Joseph's, Penfield — As part of an ongoing effort by the parish community to aid Haitian orphanages, hospitals and charitable organizations ministering to the poor in Haiti, the Resurrection Theater Company of Haiti will present a cameo performance of "Rue Soleil" in the church on Friday, June 19 at 7:30 p.m. The touring company consists of 20 boys aged 8-18 who have been rescued from the streets, the dump and the youth detention center in Port-au-Prince, Haiti, by Michael Geilenfeld, a former Missionary of Charity who is devoting his life to saving the lives of young, abandoned Haitians.

Geilenfeld has founded St. Joseph's Boys' Home in Port-au-Prince, where he teaches the boys academic subjects as well as art, music, dance, English and religion. St. Joseph's parish in Rochester supports the orphanage and other agencies through parishioners' tithes. In April, 1986, a group of parishioners went to Haiti for a weeklong working retreat, and another group plans to go in August of this year.

In addition, as a result of the efforts of a Haitian-born Rochesterian, Joseph Pierre, and members of St. Joseph's parish, a hospital in Borgne, Haiti, will soon receive badly needed medical equipment and supplies. A year ago, Dr. Mike Mirwald, a parishioner and staff member of Rochester General Hospital, responded to a request from Father Jim Moynihan, pastor, for donations of medical supplies to Haiti. The retreatants who visited Haiti in April, 1986, delivered the supplies to various clinics, hospitals and schools.

This year, Mirwald and St. Joseph's responded again, when Pierre returned to Rochester after a visit to Borgne and notified them that a hospital in his home town had no beds or medications. Mirwald was able to obtain 16 hospital beds, a large storage cabinet, a wheelchair and a wide assortment of surplus hospital supplies made available by Rochester General's recent renovation.

Corpus Christi pursues peace goals

Corpus Christi, Rochester — The parish has scheduled three Masses to be celebrated at the main gate of the Seneca Army Depot, on June 17, July 22 and August 25. All are invited to join parish members for the Eucharist on those evenings, and to observe a weekly day of fasting for peace.

In addition, the parish's sanctuary committee may soon become a sister parish to a base community in El Salvador. Margaret Sullivan, coordinator of the Parish-to-Parish Program of the SHARE foundation, will explain the program to parishioners after the Thursday night Mass on June 11. Corpus Christi parishioner Cecilia Moran of El Salvador is also expected to speak at the Mass about her experiences in her native country.

On June 14 at 8:30 p.m., parishioners are also invited to attend a planning meeting for the parish's peace and justice committee.

Student government representatives at Mother of Sorrows School sponsored a lip-sync contest for fellow students last month.

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
Contestants, who performed to the music of the Beach Boys, Whitney Houston and the Jets, were judged on their appearance, originality and lipsynching ability.

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
