

Parish offers series on St. Alphonsus

St. Alphonsus, Auburn -- Father Joseph Oppitz, a Redemptorist priest from Ephrata, Pa., will offer a week-long series of talks on "St. Alphonsus and His Way of Holiness." The nightly talks are scheduled from Sunday, July 26, through Friday, July 31, at 7:30 p.m.

A specialist in the area of Alphonsian history and spirituality, Father Oppitz will also be on hand for the August 1st celebration of the 200th anniversary of St. Alphonsus Liguori, and will speak at all Masses on the weekend of July 25 and 26.

Father Oppitz describes his objective as being "practical, down-to-earth, and spiritually motivating ... (to conduct) a week that will move (people) closer to the Lord, His mother, prayer, Eucharist and real Christian living with each other." All are invited to attend.

The program will continue to provide housing as well as on-thejob training for ex-offenders, who will work in the restaurant.




Father Paul J. Freemesser was listed as a major in the U.S. Army. He is now a lieutenant colonel.
