Parish to continue Family Masses

Immaculate Conception, Ithaca — A strong positive response from parishioners to the monthly family/youth Masses initiated last fall has prompted Immaculate Conception's parish staff to continue the program this

In an attempt to increase Mass attendance and participation among families with young children, parish staff members last year designated the 9 a.m. Mass on the third Sunday of each month as a special family celebration. Students from different grade levels were responsible for planning each Mass. Not only were the music and readings chosen for their relevance to family concerns, but children also wrote the prayers of petition and served as lectors, altapservers, ushers and peace greeters.

Children who serve as peace greeters are assigned to various areas of the church. During the sign of peace, they greet people in their designated areas and hand them small cards on which are printed prayer requests for individuals and particular issues.

A survey gauging parishioners' reactions to the family/youth Mass has revealed positive responses even among those without children. Two-thirds of those who completed surveys rated the children's skills as lectors, readers and writers of petitions as either "excellent" or "very good."

More than half of those who responded also said they observed an increase in family discussion about Church issues and the Mass.
