Education, visitation programs set

St. Margaret Mary, Irondequoit — Parish council members and 250 volunteers will embark this month on a visitation program aimed at reaching 5,535 area homes within a single week. Organizers of the program, which is based on the theme "We're Here to Serve," hope not only to update figures regarding the number of baptized Catholics in surrounding neighborhoods, but also to evaluate the needs and talents of parish members. The results of the visitation survey will be used in developing an evangelization program to reach inactive Catholics.

Letters regarding the visitation program have already been sent to all neighboring churches and synágogues. Beginning Sunday, September, 27, parish volunteers plan to knock on every door in the following areas: east from the Genesee River and north from Ridge Road to Portland Avenue/Oakview Drive (west side only); west on Nob Hill, Dake Avenue and Winona Boulevard to Genesee.

The gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke will be the topic of an adult education series at St. Margaret Mary led by Sister Mary Bryan Ford, RSM, a theology teacher at Our Lady of Mercy High School. Silva currently serves as associate director of Cranbrook Schools in Bloomfield Hills, Mi., a complex of independent day and boarding schools known for its excellent college-preparatory programs. He is also a member of the administrative council of Cranbrook Educational Community, an internationally renowned center for the arts, education, science and culture.

Prior to assuming his current position at Cranbrook Schools, Silva served for six years at the University of Detroit, first as a member of the faculty and acting chairman of the department of psychology, and later as associate dean and acting dean of the College of Liberal Arts. During that period, he was active on committees involved with long-range planning, curriculum and academic standards, and served as a professional consultant on vocational assessment, career counseling and marketing.

Silva has published numerous papers and articles dealing with his work in physiological psychology, human neuropsychology and sensory/perceptual processing. He holds a doctorate from the University of Florida.

Stephen P. Kelbley has been elected to the Nazareth College of Rochester Board of Trustees. A Brighton resident, Kelbley is senior vice president for finance at Bausch & Lomb, Inc. He also serves as first vice president for the Rochester chapter of the Financial Executives Institute and vice president of the board of directors at GeVa Theatre.

Rochester native Frank Interlichia has been appointed director of development at Nazareth College of Rochester. Previously, Interlichia had served as communications and membership services manager for the Falmouth Chamber of Commerce in Falmouth, Mass.

The award, established by Rochesterarea residents of Italian heritage, annually recognizes a Nazareth student committed to the study of Italian language and culture.
