After serving for four years on the faculty of the United Theological College, an interdominational seminary in southwestern India, Dr. Karaban has returned to the United States with her husband, **Devadasan Premnath**, and four-year-old daughter, **Deepa**.

Dr. Karaban will be far less conspicious in Rochester than she was in Bangalore, where she was not only one of the seminary's few female faculty members, but also a rare Christian in an area populated predominantly by Hindus. "In a country where only 3 percent of the population is Christian, it really means something to say that you are a Christian," she observed.
