PSAT/NMSQ test each year. Approximately 15,000 semifinalists are chosen in the fall to advance in the competition for scholarships.

Forty-four percent of the estimated 13,500 finalists chosen this spring are expected to win Merit Scholarships, totaling \$23 million. Finalists are chosen based not only on their test scores, but also on such factors as activities, honors, personal interests, values and

The annual competition is conducted by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, which is devoted solely to scholarship activities. The scholarship program operates without federal or state funds. Instead, scholarships are underwritten by more than 600 sponsoring organizations.

Father William A. Moorby has accepted the position of part-time spiritual director for the Catholic Charismatic Renewal (CCR) in the Diocese of Rochester.


