## Descent activist addresses Elmira conference Bishop Thomas F. Gumbleton of Detroit the U.S. bishops' 1983 pastoral letter. "The The Detroit auxiliary bishop presented by

spoke to nearly 230 conference participants gathered at Elmira College on Saturday, Dec. 12. Noted for his activist efforts in the peace movement, the president of Pax Christi-U.S.A. commented on the treaty to ban intermediate-range missiles signed at the White House this week by President Ronald Reagan and Soviet General Secretary Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

"This is only a beginning. We have a long way to go to establish peace in the world, especially in the light of President Reagan's continuing desire to put Star Wars weapons in place," Bishop Gumbleton said.

Bishop Gumbleton attributed his long and occasionally valiant efforts for peace and the elimination of nuclear weapons to the inspiration provided by Thomas Merton. Bishop Gumbleton said he had never met the Trappist monk, but that he has used Merton's writings as a guide in his search for peace.

Bishop Gumbleton's's desire to reverse the direction of the arms race found expression

the U.S. bishops' 1983 pastoral letter, "The Challenge of Peace: God's Promise and Our Response.' He was one of five U.S. bishops who participated in the writinfg of the historic pastoral.

"The acceleration of the arms race — still in progress despite the recent treaty — cost the American people 900 billion dollars last year," the bishop said. "Contrast that figure with the fact that that 800 million people live in poverty. This should distress us greatly; it is a moral evil."

Reaction to Bishop Gumbleton's remarks was generally positive among the 230 people who attended the conference.

Deacon William Dougherty called the bishop "a herald's voice on the college campus." Sister Patricia Carroll "was impressed by his simplicity and his persuasive desire to eliminate violence and hatred."

"Bishop Gumbleton's very presence is peaceful," Father Daniel Holland observed. "At the same time he challenges lifestyles materially oriented. He is an evangehst with a unique mystique." The Detroit auxiliary bishop presented his views during the morning liturgy and keynote address of the day-long "Making Peace-Doing Justice" conference, which was presented by the Southern Tier Office of Social Ministry, Elmira College Campus Ministry and the Chemung County Council of Churches. Subtitled "Weaving Threads of Faith and Action," the conference also offered workshops on such topics as anti-Sovietism, the environment as a peace and justice issue, and parenting for peace and justice.

The conference was designed to lead people of the Southern Tier to a renewed and deeper involvement in the struggle for peace through justice. Organizers said they hoped to challenge participants to see opportunities to develop economic justice and peace by converting what they termed "a defenseoriented economy" to one that is centered on needed goods and services, and full employment.

## Nazareth Hall student captures oratorical competition

Jeff Wagner, an eighth-grader at Nazareth Hall in Rochester, has won the Seventh Annual Bishop Matthew H. Clark Oratorical Competition. Wagner was chosen from among 36 contestants who gathered Saturday, Dec. 5, at Our Lady of Mercy High School. He will receive a \$1,000 scholarship to be applied toward tuition at the Catholic high school of his choice.

Mario Fallone, a student from St. Theodore's School in Gates, finished in second place, receiving a \$750 scholarship. All Saints Academy School in Corning supplied the thirdplace winner, Jonathan Methven, who earned a \$500 scholarship. All three top finishers received trophies.

Also recognized with certificates of participation were: Mary Ognibene, St. Pius X School, fourth place; Jennifer Bellavia, St. Lawrence School, fifth place; and Kimberly St. Clair, Good Shepherd School, sixth place.

Sponsored by the diocesan Office of General

Education, the oratorical competition featured 36 contestants from Catholic elementary schools across the diocese. Each participant wrote and memorized an original three-minute speech on the topic "Building the City of God?" Following is the text of Jeff Wagner's first-
