Appeal officials have created a method for resolving such a problem, Sullivan said. "If a pastor felt the quota we gave him might not be achievable due to a change in the parish community, we have available for the pastor a formula/adhering committee, which is a subcommittee of the Priests' Advisory Committee," he explained. This subcommittee reviews parish quotas based on additional information supplied by the pastors. This year, 13 parishes requested reductions. Eleven of the requests were granted.

No parish has yet conceded failure in meeting its quota, Sullivan said. He is optimistic that parishes which have yet to submit their reports will show the same pattern of success reflected to date. Final figures for the campaign will be ready for release in early January, he said.

Father Moynihan, who was likewise pleased by the campaign's positive preliminary results, is already looking ahead to goals for future appeals. "I'd like to see our donor base expand," he said. Last year's figure of 64,200 was a substantial improvement over 1985, he pointed out. Yet it is still down from the numbers of the early 1980s, when more than 70,000 contributors participated.

"Many hands make light work, and if many people participate it makes the burden lighter on the others," he concluded.

Cookbook, donation provide transportation for agency

Residents and non-residents of Rochester's northwest side have rallied around an effort to buy new vans for the Charles Settlement House, 445 Jay St., Rochester. The vans will transport more than 1,500 people annually to community events and programs, which are sponsored by the social-service agency.

Realizing that its 10-year-old van would need to be replaced, the Charles Settlement House — a Catholic Charities agency decided to capitalize upon the rich ethnic mix of the neighborhood to pay for a new van.

"Our volunteers decided to raise money for a new van by selling a cookbook filled with the ethnic recipes of area residents," said Gail Blanchard, executive director of the settlement house.

As a result of many hours of labor - and free printing by Edison Tech students - The Charles Settlement House Collection of Recipes went on sale at \$4.50 per copy.

When news of the neighborhood's selfhelp program reached Citibank, the bank decided to give the Settlement House a \$15,000 grant to purchase a new, 12-seat van. News of the grant spurred neighborhood
