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## Living by the law of the Lord

By Father Albert Shamon Sunday's readings: (R3) Luke 2:22-40; (R1) Sirach 3:2-6, 12-14; (R2) Colossians 3:12-21.

The first reading for next Sunday is taken from the book of Sirach (SIGH-rack). Sirach used to be called Ecclesiasticus or the "Church Book" because it was used extensively by the Church in instructing catechumens on the moral life. The book was written around 175 B.C. in Hebrew, and then translated into Greek about 132 B.C. by Sirach's grandson. The Jews of Jamnia (c. A.D. 85) did not accept the book as inspired. The Church always has.

To a Jew, the family is the bedrock institution of the nation, which I believe is as it should be. Sirach tells us something about the family that all of us would do well to rediscover today - namely that the family is no man-made institution. It is God who has established the family! God did not establish the state, but He established the family. "The Lord sets a father ... over his children; a mother's authority ... over her sons?"

As always, God knows best. When children honor, revere and love their parents, they will find happiness. "Happy are those who walk in the way of the Lord?"

Perhaps family relationships are the most difficult to keep in peace. Rub two pieces of wood together and you get fire. Remember that each person is a unique individual and it is easy to understand that when you put them under the same roof, you get friction that can and often does end in murder. Read The Brothers Karamazov or the more recent Blood and Money by Thomas Thompson.

A lubricant is needed to prevent the pistons in a car engine from rubbing against the cylinders and destroying the engine. In the same way, personality friction can destroy a family unless the family's life is "lubricated." That lubricant is a virtue!

# A Word for Sunday

St. Paul has enumerated in the second reading the virtues that make a family's life together run smoothly: mercy — which means having a heart for the shortcomings of others or stooping down to lift another up in love; kindness — to be on fire with the urge to seek the other's good; humility — to know one's limitations and to accept them; meekness - to forgive and not to strike back; patience — to bear with one another, to be tolerant; love - the overall spirit that makes the practice of virtue a delight. The result is peace — the tranquility of calm that comes from right order.

Lastly, St. Luke tells us what is the root and source of all virtue. It is God! The family of Nazareth was happy because it was holy. It was holy because it was God-fearing. Mary and Joseph went to the temple. They offered sacrifice "in accord with the dictate of the law of the Lord." When the pair had fulfilled all the prescriptions of the law of the Lord, they went

There are so many divorces today, so much marital unhappiness, so many needing Ann Landers. Why? Too often God and His laws have no room in family homes. From my years of pastoral experience, I know how many families - unlike the Holy Family - do not fulfill the prescriptions of the law of the Lord. They miss Sunday Mass without the least qualm of conscience. They neglect prayers, and live as if God did not exist. How sad! For, "unless the Lord build the house, they labor in vain who build it!" (Psalms 127:1).
