Gala to recall memories of St. Agnes High

Sunday, Jan. 24, will bring back memories for the alumnae and faculty of the former St. Agnes High School...

Many of the St. Agnes alumnae are involved in Rochester's business and professional communities, and they recall with fondness the ways in which St. Agnes prepared them for their current successes.

According to 1967 graduate Bonnie Meath-Long, associate professor of English at the National Technical Institute for the Deaf, the single-sex environment provided by St. Agnes encouraged its students to excel.

Other alumnae credit St. Agnes for fostering leadership among its students. "We were immersed in an environment that was necessary and useful in promoting the development of leadership skills, self-confidence and personal growth," said Dr. Marguerite Dynski, SSJ, a member of St. Agnes' class of 1965.

One student's mother always believed her daughter had leadership traits. But the daughter, Greece Republican Chairwoman Kathryn Whelan Phelan, credits St. Agnes for developing her potential.

Likewise, Barbara Miller Healy, director of Occupational Health Nursing at Eastman Kodak Company, feels that St. Agnes' academic atmosphere contributed to her career success.

St. Agnes alumnae also remember their alma

ter for the personal closeness it engendered. "The size gave us the chance to develop lasting relationships with other students and the staff on a one-to-one basis," recalls Joyce Lap-petito Bittner, who graduated from St. Agnes in 1953...

The elegant old structure is also remembered by Whelan Phelan, who attended the East Main campus and moved with her senior class to the new East River Road facility.

These and many other memories of St. Agnes will be recalled at the January 24 reunion, which will take place from 1:30-4:30 p.m. at the Sisters of St. Joseph Motherhouse, 4095 East Ave., Rochester.
