## We must be our brother's keepers By Father Albert Shamon Sunday's readings: (R3) Mark 1:29-39; (R1) Job 7:1-4, 6-7; (R2) 1 Corinthians 9:16-19, 22-23. When Jesus walked this earth, He was mightily tempted to become a welfare worker. No person ever pitied the sick, the disturbed or the helpless as deeply as He did. One evening in the town of Capernaum, Jesus cured the ailments of everyone brought to Him. But the next morning, Jesus got up and went to a lonely desert spot to pray. Why? To resist the temptation to stay on in Capernaum and cure everybody - to resist the temptation of reducing the Gospel to a purely social ministry or a liberation theology. Thus, when Simon and the others wanted Him to go back to Capernaum and continue with His miracles, Jesus firmly refused, saying, "Let us move on . . . that I may proclaim the good news . . . That is what I have come to do?'

The great Paul also clearly saw what the mission of the apostle must be. "I am under compulsion to preach the Gospel," he wrote. "I have no other choice?

To heal the sick or drive out demons is not why Jesus came to earth. Yes, we must help the sick, the poor, the afflicted - by all means! But we must always keep our priorities straight: The first task of the apostle is to preach the Gospel.

That is why apparitions occur in the Church. The Gospel message often gets clouded, so God sends Our Lady to dissipate the cloudy thinking.

I do not think the messages of Lourdes and Fatima ever really got through to the majority of Catholics. Most people generally visit these shrines just to ask for something for themselves. That is why Our Lady has found it necessary to appear at Medjugorje. The messages of Fatima, Lourdes and now Medjugorje are for mankind, the Church, the world - not for our personal pieties. God's plan for humanity is the salvation of the whole world. That is why Jesus died.

One of the great mistakes we tend to make in our prayer lives is to focus exclusively on our

own personal needs. Like the murderer Cain, some tend to say, "I'm not my brother's keeper." Well, that is precisely what Our Lady and the Gospel tell us to be - our brothers' keepers. Our Lady asks us to expand our prayer horizons. At Fatima, she asked that we pray for sinners going to hell and for the conversion of Russia, the land of studied athiesm.

But who paid attention? So, again at Medjugorje Our Lady has repeated her requests. She wants us to become catholic in our prayer lives - to broaden our outlooks to include everyone, especially sinners. The point of her messages is that we are in a spiritual ghetto, thinking only about ourselves and not about God's plan and her plan — the salvation of mankind.

Mirjana, one of the visionaries of Medjugorje who is now studying in Sarajevo, ceased having daily apparitions of Our Lady in 1982. However, Our Lady did promise to continue appearing to her on her birthdays, March 18. On March 18, 1985, Mirjana's 20th birthday, Our Lady appeared to her for about 20 minutes. She pleaded with Mirjana, and through her with us, to pray for non-believers. Here are the exact words Mirjana reported: "They (non-believers) are also my children. I suffer much on account of them. If they only knew what awaits them if they do not convert . . . Please pray for them, Mirjana" (Blue Book, p. 139).
