Holy Redeemer

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According to Susan Porter, a Friends of Holy Redeemer member, the group is hoping to distribute 1,000 postcards in the neighborhood. Surveys are also being conducted among area residents.

"As neighbors of Holy Redeemer Church, we're asking (the diocese) to please allow more time for (usable) proposals to be put forth," said Porter, who organized a petition drive in December urging the diocese to table demolition plans for the German church. "We'd like to see it used for things like housing the homeless or feeding the hungry, but these are just spontaneous ideas."

Porter said that supporters have also expressed interest in making the school an early childhood center, and added that the Landmark Society has also been talking with city school employees.

"We're also very interested to see what Ibero (American Action League) is going to do," Porter said. "They have not said anything yet because they've been trying to find a new director. Now that that's out of the way we're looking for them to come forward."

The Ibero American Action League recently named Domingo Garcia as its new director. It has operated out of the former Concordia Hall since 1968, and stands to be

affected by whatever decision the diocese makes.

According to Rudy Rivera, director of planning at Ibero, Garcia has been out of the country, but will meet with a formation committee on February 11 to determine what plan of action the organization will take.

"I know the previous director was in support of this cause," Rivera said. "We've been monitoring the situation."

Rivera's interest in Holy Redeemer extends beyond his involvement with Ibero. Living only five blocks from the church, he believes the quality of urban life is strongly related to the aesthetic quality of the neighborhood's environment.

"There ought to be the opportunity for alternatives short of destroying the building," Rivera said. "The area can use some upgrading if you think of the cosmetics of the community. Something clearly can be done."

And as a parishioner at nearby St. Michael's Church on North Clinton Avenue, Rivera looks at Holy Redeemer as "the mother of St. Michael's."

"The presence of the Church helps us keep the faith. If you take something like that away, you lose a lot in the process," said Rivera, a member of St. Michael's finance committee.

"This is a problem that should not be solely borne by the people that attend Holy Redeemer," he said. "So goes Holy Redeemer so goes everything else."

Stole fees

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Some priests in larger parishes do have to officiate more weddings and funerals than those in smaller ones, Father Kiggins acknowledged. Yet, "if you look at the man in the small parish, he has a smaller staff and may have to assume other duties," he remarked. "It's hard to say one priest is working less than another."

If problems arise because of the recommended salary schedule for 1988/89, the Salary and Benefits Committee will recommend adjustments in future salary schedules as is needed, Father Kiggins said. One area the committee might consider, for example, is making adjustments based on parish size, but pressure to do this "will have to come from the priests in them," he said.

Father Kiggins also said that additional

areas to be addressed had already surfaced — in part because of comments priests included on the survey. The adjustment does not apply to deacons, or to retired or visiting priests, for example. At the close of his survey analysis, Father Kiggins had suggested possible guidelines for compensation of priests excluded from the current policy, but no official sanction had been given to these guidelines yet. Guidelines for deacons will have to be considered in the future.

Other areas for consideration might emerge as the 1988/89 guidelines are implemented. Father Kiggins remarked, "Like any systemic change, there will be a fallout of details," he explained. "Some adjustments will have to be made for things not considered at first."

In spite of the assurances, Father Weiss remains doubtful about possible consequences of the adjustment. "Some priests will benefit from the adjustment, and some will not," he noted, predicting that "a lot of parishes are going to suffer."
