Monarchs deal Lady Cards first loss, tie up league

When Julie Buntich transferred from Rush-Henrietta to Our Lady of Mercy High School last summer, most everyone thought the Monarchs were a shoo-in to take back the Private-Parochial League title they lost to Cardinal Mooney the year before.

The emergence of the junior standout was a little slower in coming than many expected, however, as Buntich strived to learn a new system under a new coach.

Now the junior wing guard is teaching her teammates and Mercy's opponents a thing or two. Buntich's latest "Larry Bird-like" performance came in a crucial Private-Parochial League showdown against visiting Cardinal Mooney on Thursday, Feb. 11, when she poured in 30 points to spur Mercy to a 58-51 win. The win by the Monarchs forced a tie between Mercy (15-2) and Mooney (17-1) for the top spot in the all-Catholic school league. Both teams are 6-1 in league play.

Much of the junior sensation's damage was done in the fourth quarter, when she scored 12 of her team's 17 points. Overall, Buntich shot 14-for-21 from the field with many of her points coming in Mercy's revived transition game.

And the way Mercy coach Kathy Boughton was talking after the game, class isn't over yet for Mercy's opponents who must try and stop Buntich.

"She still has a ways to go; she holds back at times," said Boughton, whose Monarchs have now handed two teams — the Lady Cards and the Red Raiders of Fairport — their only losses of the season. "When you have a player of that ability, you have to use her anyway you

And Boughton did just that. Taking advantage of a zone defense early in the first quarter, the Monarchs were able to jump out to a 16-8 lead after one quarter.

"We expected Mooney to come out in a man-to-man; we were able to penetrate (offensively) against their zone," Boughton said.

Mooney coach Scott Morrison said he opted to play a zone defense in the game's early stages to see how his team matched up against the Monarchs. "Playing man-to-man right away can hurt you," said Morrison, whose team was led by Cheryl Lennox's 16 points.

What hurt Mooney more was poor shooting and careless turnovers, which led to several easy Mercy baskets much to the enjoyment of the charged-up home crowd. Mercy's fast

break enabled the Monarchs to open up a 32-21 lead by intermission.

"We made some adjustments to stop the fast break in the second half," said Morrison, who noted that it was the first time a Mooney team he's coached scored 51 points in a game and lost. "We did stop (points off the fast break) but we didn't stop Buntich."

Mercy's advantage ballooned to as many as 17 in the second half. The Lady Cards were able to whittle the lead to four points on one occasion, but never got any closer.

Morrison called Buntich's performance "the best ball-handling" exhibition he had seen in his years of coaching. "In the fourth quarter it really became evident that (Buntich) was going to do anything to help her team win, he

Buntich wasn't the only determined Monarch, either. Laura Wambach scored 18 points for the night on nine-for-13 shooting, while teammates Bernadette Fagan (18 rebounds) and Maggie Whelehan (9 rebounds) helped initiate the fast break by dominating the

Mercy must now set its sights on Pittsford Mendon (18-0), which is defending Section V. Class AA champion. The Monarchs battle the top girls' team in the Rochester area in a firstround game in the Brockport Tournament Thursday, Feb. 18. Tournament-host Brockport and Hornell are the other teams competing.

"It will be our toughest game of the year." said Boughton, who added that she had seen the Vikings play on several occasions this year. "Height-wise I think we match up pretty well, but I think we have more depth. I think my starting three guards might have a little edge


