parishes must be ready to receive these people, Father Werth said, adding that "the worst thing that could happen is that a pastor didn't want to get involved and didn't delegate anyone to do it."

The priest pointed out that Bishop Clark had endorsed the crusade and noted that many local Catholics have become heavily involved in planning for it. The executive committee coordinating the crusade in Rochester includes among its members Father Werth; Father Thomas Mull, director of the Office of Liturgy; and Margery Nurnberg, director of the diocesan Department of Ecumenical and Interreli-

gious Affairs.

Such involvement has already had an influence on the Rochester crusade, Father Werth said. At the suggestion of the Catholics on its executive committee, for example, the crusade will consider homelessness in Rochester as part of its social-action component, a regular element of Graham crusades.

Father Werth urged DPC members to contact parish councils in an effort to get to them involved in the crusade and to get commitments from pastors to get involved and ready for the inquiries.

"The thing that's so attractive is it doesn't take any work," Father Werth noted. "This is a program that costs nothing that can affect the spiritual life of a whole parish."

but as we begin to fill the needs we're starting to polish and hone," he says. Future plans include developing more programs for adolescents, more training for people working in the programs, and creating an education committee to oversee the religious-education program. Jim Gallagher agrees that the parish reli-

gious education program is only just beginning. "We're riding a good crest of getting things going, but the real work is going to happen in the next two to three years," he predicts.

Nevertheless, Gallagher also acknowledges that he and other parishioners are still saddened about the loss of the school. "I'm still pro-school — you can never replace Catholic education — and there are still people out there who are adrift," he said. "But what has happened to the parish is a boost. As dark as things were, they're much more positive now."

William E. Bouley; noted builder, civic leader

Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated Wednesday, Feb. 3, for William E. Bouley of Auburn. The Mass was concelebrated at St. Alphonsus Church, Auburn, by Fathers Clarence W. Gardner, Foster P. Rogers, James C. Enright, William J. Gaynor, P. Paul Brennan and John J. Nacca, and Monsignor James D. Cuffney.

Mr. Bouley died February 1 at his home following a long illness.

Born in Montreal, Canada, in 1892, Mr. Bouley first came to Auburn in 1924 to supervise construction of Auburn Memorial Hospital. Before settling in Auburn in 1932, he traveled throughout the Northeast, supervising various construction projects, including the Chrysler Building in New York City.

In 1932, Mr. Bouley established William E. Bouley Co., Inc., in Auburn. The company constructed many prominent buildings in central and western New York, including the Rochester War Memorial.

Mr. Bouley was a founder and charter member of the General Building Contractors of New York State, Inc.; a founder, past president and director of the Building Industry Employers of New York State; and a founder and past officer of the Auburn Builders Exchange and

the Building Employers Trade Association of Auburn.

Active in civic affairs, Mr. Bouley was a past member of the Executive Board of Cayuga County Council of Boy Scouts of America, and a founder and past director of Little League Baseball of Auburn, Inc. He was also a member of the Auburn Council No. 207 Knights of Columbus, Fourth Degree; Owasco Country Club; Auburn YMCA; BOPE Elks Club; Auburn Rotary Club; Auburn Memorial Hospital Association; Auburn Bowling Association; and the Auburn Old Time Boxers Club.

A devoted communicant of St. Alphonsus Church, Mr. Bouley and his wife, Zella Bouley, celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary with a special Mass at the church in August, 1987.

Mr. Bouley is survived by his wife; three sons: C. Alan Bouley and James Bouley, both of Auburn, and Terrence J. Bouley of Juno Beach, Florida; 12 grandchildren; 10 great grandchildren; and several nieces and nephews. He was predeceased by a son, William E. Bouley, Jr., who was killed in action on December 13, 1944, at the Battle of the Bulge during World War II.

Interment was in St. Joseph's Cemetery.
