Aquinas accolades

Dave Hemmerick, a senior from Aquinas Institute and a member of the Section 5 Monroe County High School champions, was recently selected the recipient of the Thomas M. Nicholas Memorial Scholarship Award for his performance in the Monroe County High School Hockey League this season. Hemmerick was presented the award at a ceremony between periods of the Rochester Americans-Adirondack Red Wings hockey game on Sunday, March 27.

Kodak All-American

St. John Fisher senior guard Louise Mac-Donald added another feather to an already well-plumed cap last week when she was named to the 1988 Kodak Women's All-America Basketball Team for Division III

The Welland, Ontario, resident was named to the prestigious 10-member squad by the Women's Basketball Coaches' Association after completing her best season ever. It was a season in which MacDonald led the nation in field-goal shooting, broke 1,000 career points and placed first among her teammates in scoring (15.7 ppg), assists (169) and steals

MacDonald, who was recently named Eastern College Athletic Conference Upstate Region Player of the Year, was one of the prime reasons the Lady Cardinals won state and regional titles this season on the way to a 31-1 record and second-place finish in the NCAA tournament.

"It's kind of a reflection on the team," MacDonald said. "We had a good team, so it made me play better."

A third-team all-America pick by the American Women's Sports Federation last season, MacDonald has received a slew of awards in the two seasons she has started for the Lady Cardinals, including MVP honors in local, state and regional tournaments. Being selected as the only upstate New York representative on the Kodak All-America team was simply the icing on the cake.

"It was one of the goals I set out for myself," MacDonald said, noting that another of her objectives is to play semi-pro basketball in Europe next fall.
