Sister Rosemary Sullivan, FMM, has been elected provincial superior of the United States Province of the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary, an international congregation serving in more than 75 countries.



A Rochester native, Sister Sullivan grew up in St. Augustine's Parish and joined the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary after graduating from Our Lady of Mercy High School in 1947. She graduated from St. Joseph's College for Women, Lumen Vitae, in Belgium and Andover Newton Theological School.

In 1959, Sister Sullivan went to Singapore to direct the diocesan religious education program. She returned to the United States in 1969 to serve as the director of the Mount St. Francis Day Care Center in Woonsocket, Rhode Island. Since returning to the United States, she has also served as a provincial councilor, a delegate to two of the order's general chapters in Rome, and as an associate pastor of Christ the King Parish in Hamilton, Georgia. She also has directed the Fellowship of Christians United for Service.
