

Jesus the good shepherd

Sunday's readings: (R3) John 10:11-18; (R1) Acts 4:8-12; (R2) 1 John 3:1-2.

Seven Sundays separate Easter and Pentecost. The first three Sundays of Easter focus on the reality of the resurrection of Jesus. The last four Sundays focus on His presence in the Christian community. Jesus is risen! So what? What difference does the risen Jesus make in our lives? That's the question!

The last four Sundays describe the relationship that should exist between Christ and His own, and between His own to one another. He is to us as the shepherd is to his sheep (fourth Sunday) and the vine to its branches (fifth Sunday). We are to love one another as He loves us (sixth Sunday).

Therefore, the shepherd prays for His sheep (seventh Sunday) and on Pentecost sends His Spirit. We need His prayers and His Spirit.

The first readings are from the Acts of the Apostles, because the Acts tell of the life, witness and growth of the early Church. How fitting this is, since the Acts are replayed in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults and in this period of mystagogia. The second readings are from the first epistle of John, affirming the joyous faith and firm hope of the neophytes.

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus calls Himself "the good shepherd." There were other shepherds around — false ones who allowed the flock to be destroyed and scattered (Jeremiah 23:1-2). Jesus is a good shepherd, not because He is kindly and gentle, but because "He lays down His life for His sheep?' And, "I lay down my life freely."

This is not hyperbole. David did battle with both a lion and a bear in order to retrieve sheep the wild animals had taken from his father's fold. Similarly, Jesus, like a lamb, lets Himself be led to the slaughter to save the flock. His death saves because He has the power to pick up His life again. Good Friday ends in

saved by the name of Jesus (R1). St. John

writes that those saved are called children of God in this life and are destined to be like God in the unrevealed future life (R2). And Jesus declares that He is closer to them than a shepherd is to his sheep (R3), for He gives His life for them, motivated not by money but by

Love will prompt us to forget about a scheduled event when a neighbor drops in needing someone to listen and to care.
