Fisher College to host talk by key adviser to Solidarity

The current state of labor unrest in Poland will be discussed on Monday, May 16, at 7:30 p.m. when a celebrated scholar and key adviser to Poland's Solidarity movement speaks at St. John Fisher College.

Dr. Tadeusz Kowalik, a senior researcher at the Polish Academy of Sciences in Warsaw and onetime adviser to the now-outlawed Solidarity labor union, will be the guest speaker. "The Rise and Fall of Solidarity and the Present Situation in Poland" will be Kowalik's topic for the free lecture, which will be held in Room B-135 of Fisher's Basil Hall.

Kowalik, who is currently a visiting professor of social science and economics at York University in Canada, served as an adviser to the Interfactory Strike Committee at the birth of Solidarity in Gdansk in 1980, later joining the union's national advisory board. He is the author of several major publications, including the recent "On Crucial Reform in Real Socialism."

The lecture is part of the Skalny Lecture and Artist Series of the Institute for Polish Studies at Fisher, and is made possible through a grant from the Louis Skalny Foundation Trust.
