

## DeSales 14, Whitman 6

Running back Chris Ike, who rushed for 90 yards, scored on runs of 32 yards and five yards in the third quarter to keep the Saints (4-0, 5-0) unbeaten and ruin Whitman's Homecoming game.

Marcus Whitman, which normally runs itsoffense out of an "I" formation, used the "shotgun" — a passing formation — to jump out to a 6-0 lead at halftime. Whitman's touchdown came on a 70-yard scoring drive on its second possession of the game.

"They wanted to spread us way out (on defense) by using a shotgun formation. It scared the living daylights out of me at first; I thought it was going to be a long day," said DeSales head coach Bob Taney. "They didn't feel they could run against us."

Taney made a defensive adjustment at halftime to offset the ploy by Whitman (2-3). "We normally play a zone, but we shot one of our linebackers in to neutralize that," Taney said.

DeSales' defense forced Whitman to turn the ball over six times: four in the air and two rushing. The Saints compiled 267 yards in total offense. Quarterback Ron Cecere was 8-for-18 passing for 114 yards.-

The Finger Lakes West division title comes down to this week's game between DeSales and Romulus (3-0, 5-0). Romulus ran up nearly 350 yards rushing to blank Red Jacket 22-0 last weekend.

Taney said his Saints must try to stop the Warriors' running game, forcing them to do something they haven't done too much this season - pass.

"Romulus is a very physical team, they pride themselves in their strength," Taney said. "They haven't thrown the ball all year."

Offensively, the Saints may throw the ball more this Saturday, Oct. 15, at 4 p.m. "We see a few areas where we can exploit the defense," Taney said.

"I wasn't too worried when we weren't playing well in the early part of the season," LaPietra said. "I knew we'd come around."
