Cards back in post-season picture; Knights nip Kings, 1-0

Several diocesan high school boys' soccer teams solidified chances of gaining sectional berths last week, most notably Cardinal Mooney.

Paul Forte's Cards, coming off a tough loss to Honeoye Falls-Lima two weeks ago, went 3-0-1 for the week to up their record to 7-5-4. The three victories came against Marshall, Aquinas and a forfeit by Franklin, but Mooney's most impressive showing came in a 2-2 tie against unbeaten Greece Athena (11-0-4) in a non-league game at Mooney on Saturday, Oct.

Junior wing Jim Shoniker scored on a corner kick at the eight-minute mark of the second half to forge the tie. The Cards, who jumped out to a 1-0 lead on a goal by Jeff Merkey 10 minutes into the game, fell behind 2-1 late in the first half when Athena's Ron Bonfiglio scored two goals for the Trojans within a three-minute span.

Forte was pleased with the way his players responded to the goals, taking pressure off themselves by scoring early in the second.

"We came out strong in the second half;" Forte said. "To take it to a team like Athena took a little pressure off them because they knew they were playing well?"

The Cards outshot Athena, ranked sixth among Class A schools in the latest Class A state poll, 20-13. Mooney goalie Jim D'Anza played one of his best games of the year, stopping 11 shots. Nick Smith had 17 saves for the Trojans.

The tie — added to the three wins — moved Mooney from No. 15 to No. 9 among schools in the Class A bracket. The top 14 teams in Class A qualify for the sectionals.

Forte attributed his team's turnaround to its ability to be patient amid tough times.
