Athena, which has beaten the likes of Brockport, Fairport and Gates-Chili this fall, was no match for Scott Morrison's Cards. Mooney jumped out to a 2-0 lead at the half on goals by Gia Cucinelli and Kelly Marron. Kristen Kuhns scored in the second half to up the margin to 3-0.

Keeper Julie Monfalcone made seven saves in recording her 10th shutout for the season. Mooney has allowed just nine goals in 15 games this fall.

The win over Athena rested Morrison's fears after the loss to Hilton. "I was quite concerned

after the loss to Hilton because these are the types of teams you're going to see in the sectionals," the Mooney coach said.

Morrison believes his club is peaking at the right time with sectionals approaching, but he knows not to take anything for granted.
