Parish convent reopens under inter-religious staff

St. Vincent de Paul, Corning - Three wornen religious on staff at St. Vincent's, St. Mary's and St. Patrick's parishes have reopened St. Vincent's former parish convent on Griffith Street as an inter-religious convent.

The parish's pastoral assistant, Sister Raymond Joseph Griffith, and Sister Edna Slyck, pastoral assistant at St. Patrick's, are Sisters of Mercy. Sister Mary Ann Sliwa, pastoral assistant at St. Mary's in Corning, is a Sister of St. Joseph. Diocesan officials view the Corning effort as a pilot program for what could become the norm in the future.

Parish council endorses California grape boycott

Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Rochester -The parish council unanimously passed a resolution to support the nationwide boycott of California grapes, at a meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 8. The boycott was started in 1984 by Cesar Chavez and the United Farm Workers.

The boycott has three objectives: A ban on the pesticides captan, parathion, phosdrin, dinoseb and methyl bromide; a joint UFWgrower testing program for poisonous residues on grapes sold in stores, with the results made public; and free and fair elections for farmworkers and good faith collective bargaining,
