Cluster staff member leaving

CAYUGA COUNTY — Sister Brigid Quinn, RSM, has announced that she will leave her position as pastoral associate of the Cayuga Team Ministry cluster in June of this year.

Sister Quinn, who helped establish the cluster five years ago, cited her age, two major surgeries in the last five years, the constant travel involved in serving the four-parish cluster and 41 years of continuous ministry as reasons for her decision.

Sister Quinn also noted that next year, Father William Spilly, the cluster's pastor, will be faced with the decision whether to renew his contract with the cluster or to choose another pastoral opening. As a result, Sister Quinn decided to leave now rather than create the potential for the cluster to lose two staff members the same year. "It's kind of devastating for a community to lose two leaders at the same time," she observed. "This would give someone a year to get used to the parish."

Deacon John Prave, a member of the cluster's pastoral team, said that Sister Quinn will be missed. "She's been involved in practically all aspects of ministry here and as a result has touched the lives of many people," he noted. "Personally, she's been a good companion, a good person to work with, and she certainly has been a model for spiritual growth."

Sister Quinn said her decision was a difficult one because it means leaving the people of the cluster and a job she really enjoys. However, she said, "I know it's time for me to leave and for someone else to build on what's already here."

Sister Quinn is hoping to take a short break from active ministry and has applied to the Sisters of Mercy for a sabbatical. If the sabbatical is approved, she will use the time for to travel, visit family and friends, and complete some projects that have been pushed to the side because of her work with the cluster.

"I'd just like to step back for a while and reconnect with my family and my religious community," Sister Quinn explained. "Then, I'll be ready to answer another call to ministry."
