# **Neglected middle-ground Catholics**

According to sources close to the vice president's successful presidential campaign, George Bush's strategists targeted three voting groups as key to an electoral victory: women, evangelical Protestants in the South, and Catho-

The president-elect worked hard at cultivating all three constituencies, but he seemed to pursue the Catholics with special determination.

He made well-publicized and highly controversial appearances at the University of Notre Dame and at Seattle University, a Jesuit institution, and spoke at a number of smaller Catholic institutions as well, including several high schools.

Mr. Bush's campaign managers also scheduled some crucial photo-opportunity sessions with Catholic bishops: Archbishop John May of St. Louis, president of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops; Archbishop John F. Whealon of Hartford; and Cardinal John Krol, retired Archbishop of Philadelphia.

Mr. Bush even appointed a campaign liaison for Catholics, Mr. Dinesh D'Souza, a young journalist with strong conservative credentials.

Governor Michael Dukakis did speak at Georgetown and the University of Scranton, both Jesuit institutions, but otherwise showed no special interest in Catholics as a distinct voting bloc.

Although exit polls disclosed that Governor Dukakis won the Catholic vote by a clear margin, they also revealed that abortion had been a significant issue for many.

Conservative pro-life Catholics were angered by the governor's stand on abortion, and they voted for Vice President Bush overwhelmingly. But that was to be expected.

What the Dukakis campaign may not have anticipated was the uneasiness felt by many middle-of-the-road and moderately liberal Catholics over the platform's and the candidate's abortion stance.

These Catholics largely agree with the governor on the legal aspects of the abortion controversy, but they are convinced that the issue has a moral dimension as well.

Neither the platform nor the candidate displayed much sensitivity to that moral dimension, or else they confined their moral analysis to an affirmation of the woman's sovereignty over her own body.

The national Democratic Party and its candidates have been misreading the minds of their Catholic constituents on this issue. As much as it may hate to do so, the party is going to have to take another look at abortion before the 1992 election. When it does, it had better not seek counsel only from left-wing Catholics who fol-

low a straight pro-choice line.

There is a large middle ground in the U.S. Catholic community that both parties have been neglecting. The Democrats seem to regard leftof-center Catholics as genuinely representative of the Church on an issue like abortion.

Why else, for example, would Catholic members of Congress have invited Marquette Professor Daniel Maguire rather than Father Richard McCormick, SJ, formerly of Georgetown and now of Notre Dame, to address them on this issue earlier in the decade?

The letter of invitation, co-signed by then-Congresswoman Geraldine Ferraro, included materials provided by the pro-choice organization Catholics for a Free Choice. The whole episode came back to haunt her during her 1984 run for the vice presidency.

The Republicans, on the other hand, seem to think that only right-wing Catholics are genuinely representative of the Church. Why else would Mr. Bush have selected someone like Dinesh D'Souza to be his campaign liaison with Catholics?

Mr. D'Souza was associated during his college days at Dartmouth with the independently financed conservative student newspaper that has been embroiled recently in national controversy and has served as editor of the often stridently conservative journal Crisis.

More to the point, he has been a strong and persistent critic of the U.S. Catholic bishops' pastoral letters on peace and the economy, and of the work of key staff members at the bishops' conference — Father J. Bryan Hehir in particu-

If Mr. Bush had selected a middle-of-theroader instead of a hard-line conservative to tend his relations with U.S. Catholics, his designee might not have won him any more Catholic votes, but he or she would have at least given him an accurate picture of the Catholic community and its values -more accurate certainly that Mr. D'Souza seems to have provided.

In an interview with National Catholic New Service at the end of the campaign, Mr. D'Souza said, "The (Bush) campaign made an effort to identify with Catholic values." His examples of Catholic values? Abortion, voluntary school prayer, and tuition assistance.

Compare that list with the U.S. Catholic Bishops' consistent- ethic-of-life agenda and you see how far off the mark it is.
