Kearney's lacrosse team hoping for sectional bid

While watching the rain wash away any chance of playing a game last week, Bishop Kearney's lacrosse team got some good news and some bad news.

The good news was that the Kings (6-5) will get one of their most potent offensive players back for the remainder of the season. Beaver Smith, the Kings' highscoring midfielder, will return this week after missing four consecutive games because he was academically ineligible.

Before he was sidelined by poor grades, the talented Fighting King led the team in scoring with 24 goals in seven games. Attacker Jon Hand has taken over the team's scoring lead in Smith's absence.

Kearney coach Jim Burns also learned last week that he will be without goalie Mark Hall for the rest of the season because Hall has not been able to improve his grades. Hall was impressive between the pipes in helping the Kings jump out to a 5-2 start.

John Werner, who previously played defense for Kearney, has taken over the goaltending duties.

Kearney dropped three of four games with Smith and Hall absent from the lineup, but the losses did not reflect Werner's play. Two of the Kings' losses to Webster and Pittsford were by a total of four goals. Kearney also dropped a 10-4 decision to Webster, but the score was 5-3 heading into the fourth quarter.

Burns has had to move several players into unfamiliar positions while his team was short-handed, but the Kearney coach believes his team has come a long way. That remains to be seen as all of Kearney's games were washed out by heavy rains last week. Sunny skies were supposed to return to western New York this week with the Kings facing a full slate of games. Kearney was scheduled to play host to McQuaid in a re-scheduled game on Monday, May 15, before playing at home against Cardinal Mooney May 18, and away against Rush-Henrietta May 19.

The Kings close out the regular season at highly touted Penfield this Saturday, May 20.

Last week's dismal weather got Burns and his players reacquainted with the school gymnasium. The Kearney coach said that he used the week of inaction to drill his players on some of the skills he saw lacking in three consecutive losses.

Burns admitted, however, that "it's tough to keep the kids up" when Mother Nature sends so many games to the showers. "In the past we've had the first couple (of games) canceled because of the rain, but never this many this late in the season," he said.

Even though he doesn't like finishing the regular season with three games in three days — especially since two of the games come against tough Monroe County League teams — Burns does not want to see any more contests rained out.

The Kearney lacrosse coach said he will stay home this Sunday, hoping to get a call from Section 5 lacrosse coordinator Pete Burkardt. "I'm not going anywhere in case he calls," Burns said.

Cheryl Lennox struck out two, walked two and gave up four hits to get the win for the Cards. Two of Mendon's three runs were unearned.


Last week's continuous rain turned the

Yet another walk by Grosvenor reloaded the bases, but he ended the threat with his second strikeout.


Grosvenor was also the star for ND offensively. He had two doubles and drove in three runs, including two of ND's three runs in the seventh inning.
