For example, the archives include the notes taken by Bishop Lawrence Casey, who served as the Bishop James Kearney's auxiliary from 1953-66, while he represented the diocese at the Second Vatican Council. These notes give an insight into the day-to-day work at the council, Father Graf said.

Father Graf noted that the files also include personal letters that show "the real care that some of our bishops had in dealing with sensitive issues." If and when those letters can be revealed, he said, they would reveal previously unknown sides of the bishops, and the struggles they went through dealing with such issues and the people involved in them.

The fact that the diocese has the archives will help preserve important documents in the future, Father McNamara speculated. "We hope that instead of passing things into the waste basket, (diocesan personnel) will pass them downstairs," he said.

In addition, parishes and individuals who have documents that might be of historical significance might be more inclined to send them to the archives knowing that they have a permanent home. Fathers Edward Golden and Peter Deckman, for example, hope to place in the archives their essays and other materials concerning their efforts to establish a lay-run parish in La Paz, Bolivia, in 1974. This material, they hope, might serve as a guide for diocesan efforts — especially through the Commitment to Ministry process — to create alternative parish leadership structures in light of the growing priest shortage.

Father McNamara noted that not only is he relieved that his campaign to find a home for the archives has succeeded, but that Father Graf has been appointed as his "co-archivist." The senior archivist expressed pleasure that he had someone who shared a sense of the history of the diocese and a sense of future directions for the archives.

"It's good to know things will be taken care of when you're gone," Father McNamara concluded.
