Irish hurling team at Fisher this Sunday

A hurling team from Rochester's sister city of Waterford, Ireland, will visit St. John Fisher College this Sunday, July 23, to play, explain and discuss the national game of Ireland.

The game, featuring players from the De Lasalle Club of Waterford, will be played at 3 p.m. on the soccer field at the college, 3690 East Ave., Rochester.

The Gaelic game is played at a lightening-quick pace with a curved stick called a caman or hurley, and a small leather ball. Each team is made up of 15 players, and games last approximately 60 minutes. Games are extended to 90 minutes during the playoffs.

Players score three points for their team if they hurl the ball into the net under the crossbar of the goal posts, and one point if the ball goes over the net but between the posts.

Ireland's national game dates back to before the 11th century. The sport developed during the Battle of Moytura, in which the team of Tuatha De and Dunan defeated the opposing Firbolgs first in a hurling match and then in a battle for the lordship of Ireland. Devotion to the sport is particularly strong in Ireland's south and southeastern regions.

Waterford, which has a population of approximately 35,000, is located in south-eastern Ireland. Irish children generally begin playing the game by the age of four or five. A Sunday game between teams from any of the 32 counties that make up Ireland can bring out as many as 60,000 spectators.

Enright to head south on full scholarship

Donna-Jean Enright, a 1987 graduate of Aquinas Institute who went on to have an outstanding two-year career as goalie for the Monroe Community College women's soccer team, has accepted a full academic scholarship to Florida International University.

Enright was the only member of the 1988 Tribunes to earn a Division I scholarship. She only allowed four goals in 16 games this past season, finishing with a goals-against average of 0.34. MCC had a record of 21-3-1, placing third in the National Junior College Athletic Association national championships.

Enright also had a superb freshman season, allowing just one goal in 13 games for a goals-against average of 0.15, which

was the best in the nation. She holds school records for shutouts in a season (12 in 1988) and career (17).

"Donna-Jean was certainly one of the strongest keepers we ever had," said MCC coach Charles Salamone, who has won three national championships in seven years. "She has an excellent athletic ability and a strong tactical sense. She's a hardnosed competitor and one of the leading reasons for our successful season in 1988."

"She's a good student, and I'm very pleased she's going on to a Division I school where she'll be able to compete successfully both on the field and in the classroom."

A 3.0 student at MCC, Enright will major in physical education at Florida International.

Former BK star drafted

Angelo Panzetta, a three-time Rochester Institute of Technology All-American who graduated from Bishop Kearney High School, was selected in the first round of the Major Indoor Soccer League draft by the Baltimore Blast July 8.

Panzetta was the eighth player taken overall in the draft, which took place in Wichita, Kan.

This has been a banner summer for the former Kearney standout. Panzetta was the unanimous choice as ICAC male team-sport athlete of the year, and one of only four Division III players invited to participate in the Budweiser Soccer Showcase in Wichita the same weekend as the draft.

In Baltimore, Panzetta will join former Webster goalie Scott Manning and former Rochester Lancers star Jim Pollihan, who is assistant coach.

DeSales, which won the Finger Lakes West baseball crown and the Section 5 Class D title this spring, had four players named to the Finger Lakes West all-star first team.

Pitcher Frank Pane Jr., infielders Steve Vedora and Paul Priebe and outfielder Matt Cannon were all named to the first team for DeSales, which had the most first team all-stars, as selected by league coaches. Naples and Romulus each had three players named to the first team.

Pane (9-0) was unbeaten as a sophomore for the Saints, who finished the season with a 15-0 mark. Vedora and Cannon, who both graduated last month, played key roles in the Saints' 6-5 win over Bradford in the Class D championship game. Priebe, a junior, virtually carried the team offensively early in the season and was a standout defensively throughout the sectionals.

The Saints also were well represented on the second team. Sophomore pitcher Jim Vedora (6-0) was tabbed for his outstanding season on the mound, while senior infielder Ron Cecere and senior outfielder Dean Askin were also picked.

DeSales' Jeff Taney, a junior, and senior Aaron Mantegna were among honorable mention selections.
