

Sister Mary Sullivan, RSM, was the featured speaker at the annual governing board meeting of the Federation of Sisters of Mercy of the Americas, held June 23-27 in Manchester, NH.

A professor of language and literature in the College of Liberal Arts at Rochester Institute of Technology, Sister Sullivan spoke to the assembled leaders of the 27 Mercy units from across the country about the reading, writing and prayers of Catherine McAuley, foundress of the Sisters of Mercy congregation. Sister Sullivan earned her master of theology degree from London University, Heythrop College, Great Britain, with a dissertation entitled, "A Contemporary Critique of the Christology of Catherine McAuley."
