

Satisfied debt leaves parish mortgage to burn

FAIRPORT — Assumption of Our Lady Parish, 20 East Ave., is celebrating the end of its six-year mortgage by burning the mortgage papers on the church steps Sunday, Sept. 3, during the parish's annual picnic from 3-8 p.m.

Father John P. Norris, pastor, will light the fire, which will be fueled by parishioners' unused debt-reduction envelopes from the month of September. Parishioners have been contributing monthly to offset the mortgage since the building campaign began in 1979. Escalating costs made it necessary to extend the debt for the church, which was completed in March, 1983.
