

Parish council decides to lease school building

ROCHESTER - St. Philip Neri's parish council voted unanimously on Monday night, Oct. 16, to lease most of its school building to the City School District, according to Father Richard Shatzel, pastor.

The school district plans to move one of its two Early Childhood Centers from its current location in the lower level of Franklin High School, 950 Norton St., to the parish school building, 1772 Clifford Ave. Currently, more than 200 children are enrolled in the childhood center, a magnet school serving students in prekindergarten through the second grade, said Kathy Pallermo, school secretary. Along with three other parish schools in the northeast quadrant, St. Philip Neri School was closed last June as part of that area's move to reorganize its Catholic schools.

Father Shatzel said that the childhood center will occupy 11 classrooms in the building. The priest added that the center and the parish will share the remaining rooms, which include the school hall and kitchen. The parish will still use the school building for such parish events as bingo and meetings, he said.

Although attorneys for the parish and the school district have yet to work out how costs will be divided, Father Shatzel noted that each will share utility costs and tax payments. He also said that the amount of rent the school district will pay the parish is vet to be determined.

The lease must still be approved by the diocese, Father Shatzel said. Once approval is secured, the center will probably move into the school building in early Januarv.




