# Bishop will dedicate new organ

CLYDE — Bishop Matthew H. Clark will dedicate the new organ at St. John's Church, 114 Sodus St., on Friday, Dec. 8, at 6 p.m.

The parish recently completed the installation of the modest size (15 ranks, 10 stops) mechanical-action pipe organ.

According to Father Thomas F. Nellis, pastor, the organ was constructed in England by J.W. Walker & Sons, Ltd. Workmen from England lived at the rectory while they reassembled, installed and voiced the organ in Clyde.

More than 250 members of the congregation made pledges of \$100 or more to fund the project, Father Nellis said. He added that the \$90,000 investment "will be costeffective in the long run because organs of this type can last for many decades, even centuries, without substantial maintenance

The purchase of the new organ was accompanied by substantial renovations to the bell tower and choir loft areas, Father Nellis said, adding that parish volunteers did much of the work.

During the organ dedication, the parish choir will sing under the direction of Lawrence Dapolito. The guest organist, Katherine Pardee, is currently the director of music at Hendricks Chapel, Syracuse University.

Pardee will play selected concert pieces before, during and after the Mass. Guest cantor will be Michael O'Hanlon from Syracuse. Ronald Stewart and Raymond Sturge will play trumpets.

All are welcome. Reserved seating will be available for those who contributed to the purchase and/or installation of the new organ. A "victory celebration" at John's Restaurant in Clyde will follow the dedica-

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
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
