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## **Indian Mission Seeks Christmas Help Priest Says Prayers, Donations Urgently Needed**

THOREAU, NM -- Ask Brooklyn - born Father Douglas A. McNeill what he wants for Christmas and he answers immediately and simply, "Help for our Navajo neighbors!"

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Urgency edging his voice, the priest explained, "There are 20 families right now needing our help on home repair in order to live through the winter. Their needs are critical."

Fr. Doug -- as he is affectionately known -- is director of St. Bonaventure Indian Mission here, where God called him 15 years ago. Today, he is joined in his work by a complement of 47 lay missioners whose goal it is to "bring the presence of Christ" to this povertystricken corner of the world. Hunger and illiteracy are two other threats to the American Indians to whom St. Bonaventure directs its extensive outreach and educational programs. And the corporal works of mercy that are carried out daily by the Mission's dedicated corps of lay missioners have not gone unnoticed by the New Mexico community at large.
