Mercy gears for Kearney after tough victory

The 1989-90 season is shaping up to be a banner one for the Private-Parochial League, as Mercy, Bishop Kearney and Aquinas continue to show that they are among the best girls' basketball teams in Section 5.

Local followers of girls' basketball already know that Our Lady of Mercy High School boasts one of the best Class A teams in the Rochester area.

The Monarchs (15-0) are making believers of basketball fans elsewhere.

The latest converts can be found at Buffalo Sacred Heart, which lost to host Mercy, 69-55, Saturday, Feb. 3.

The final score was not a true indication of the game, however, as Sacred Heart (7-3) battled Mercy all the way. The game was tied 44-44 as late as the end of the third

The Monarchs went on a 15-1 run in the fourth quarter to blow the game wide open.

The seeds of that run were actually planted earlier in the game. As they have all season, the Monarch's used their team speed and pressure defense to force turnovers, feed their own fast break, and get opponents into foul trouble.

Sacred Heart's two six-foot forwards — Texlin Quinney (who scored a game-high 30 points) and Kelly Schroer - were forced to the bench by fouls in the fourth

At that point, Mercy's inside duo took over. Catherine Robinson scored seven of her career-high 24 points, and Natalie White scored eight of her 17 points to lead the Monarch surge in the fourth quarter.

Robinson also grabbed 15 rebounds. Kim Caccamise added 14 points.

On Feb. 1, Mercy downed host Nazareth, 75-22. Robinson again led the way, scoring 20 points and grabbing 12 rebounds. White added 15 points.

Mercy was scheduled to host East on Feb. 6, and league-rival Kearney on Feb.

The Monarchs will be playing those games without junior point guard Mary Beth Cleary, who is out with torn ankle ligaments. She is not expected to return for several weeks, and Mercy may have to begin sectional play without her.

Kearney, a Class B school, raised its record to 14-2 after trouncing host Harley-Allendale Columbia 65-22 on Jan. 30. The Kings have not lost since they fell to Mercy on Dec. 14.

And in Class BB, Aquinas (11-5) pulled out two more wins, defeating host Williamson (11-3) 53-48 on Jan. 30, and visiting Wilson (8-6), 48-35, on Feb. 1. The Irish were led in both games by Amy

Reynders, who scored 25 and 13 points,

Jill Banaszewski added 11 points against Wilson.

The Irish were scheduled to host Wayne Feb. 9.

For DeSales, the week's action mirrored the team's season.

The Saints (5-5, 7-7) suffered a 59-52 loss to host Honeoye (8-2, 12-4) on Jan.

30, then came from behind to beat visiting South Seneca 49-43 on Feb. 1.

Jeneane Donahue scored 13 points in the losing effort at Honeoye. Krista DeVaney added 12, and Danielle Boncaro, 10.


