AQ, BK, McQ set for hockey championships

The Section 5 hockey championships begin Saturday, Feb. 17, for the three diocesan teams, with Aquinas and McQuaid competing in Class A, and Bishop Kearney in Class B.

The winner of each classification, as well as the top runner-up, will advance to the state tournament.

Aquinas (13-6-1) earned the third seed in Class A, and is scheduled to play sixthseeded Pittsford at 2 p.m. at Lakeshore Rinks.

The Little Irish boast a potent offense featuring Dave Perrotta and Jeff Nuccitelli. Perotta led the team and Division 1 of the Monroe County Hockey League in scoring with 40 points (24 goals, 16 assists). Nuccitelli was second with 38 points (16 goals, 22 assists). Nuccitelli also set the Aquinas career scoring record with 152 points through the end of regular-season play.

In order for Aquinas to win Class A, the Little Irish will in all likelihood have to beat second-seeded Batavia (13-6-1) and top-seeded Irondequoit (17-1-1).

The Irish beat both teams during the regular season. They handed Irondequoit its only loss of the season.

And on Feb. 8, Aquinas trounced Baťavia 8-1 at Lakeshore. In that game, Perrotta had three goals and two assists, and Nuccitelli scored one goal and two assists.

McQuaid (6-12-1) is seeded fifth in Class A, and will open post-season play at Lakeshore against fourth-seeded Greece (11-6-1). The game is scheduled to begin at 4 p.m.

The Knights lost to Greece, 9-4, at

Lakeshore on Feb. 6.

That loss came on the heels of what may have been McQuaid's best game of the season, a 2-1 upset win over Aquinas on Feb. 3.

McQ's week also included a 6-3 loss to Batavia on Feb. 7 and a 9-1 loss to Irondequoit on Feb. 10. Both games were played at Lakeshore.

The Knights have a capable offense led by Paul Mertz and Dave Simpson. Unfortunately, the Knights have difficulty stopping opponents from scoring, as they have allowed 25 goals in their last four games alone. Inconsistent play may spell a short post-season for McOuaid.

In Class B, Kearney (6-11-2) earned the fourth seed and will take on fifth-seeded Webster (2-14) at Genesee Valley Rink at 1 p.m. The Kings defeated Webster 2-0 at Lakeshore during their last meeting on Jan. 27.

Kearney relies on its defense to stay close during its games. The Kings' offense has a hard time putting points on the board, however, having scored only seven goals. in their last three games while giving up 20. Marcus Pace and Chris Accorso lead the Kings' attack.

Kearney appears likely to win its opening-round game, but with teams like Brockport (which beat the Kings 8-3 on Feb. 7), Gates-Chili (9-2 winners over Kearney on Feb. 3) and Fairport (which beat the Kings 6-2 on Jan. 20) also competing in Class B, Bishop Kearney will be hard pressed to advance far in the tournament.

If Kearney's defense can keep the contests low-scoring, however, it is fully capable of pulling off a couple of upsets.
