Saints seek to hold title; **ND** favored

The second season has begun.

Post-season play in both Sections 4 and 5 has started for diocesan boys' basketball teams, with four separate titles up for grabs.

DeSales (14-5) is the defending Section 5 Class D champion, but the fourth-seeded Saints will find it hard to repeat.

The Saints have been hurt by the decision of two standout players -seniors Jeff Taney and Chris Ike — to quit just before sectional play began. According to DeSales Coach Tony Alvaro, both players left for personal reasons.

Taney and Ike combined for more than 22 points a game during the regular season, and the void created by their decision to leave the team will put a dent in the Saints' offense.

Even more potentially damaging to the Saints' chances, however, is an injury to center and leading-scorer Bob McFadden. In DeSales' last game of the regular season, a 93-49 romp over visiting Romulus on Feb. 13, McFadden broke a finger on his shooting hand.

Alvaro said that McFadden - who was tabbed Most Valuable Player in last year's Class D tournament — will be able to play. It is yet to be seen, however, how the injury will affect McFadden's shooting.

Entering the sectionals, the Saints have only eight players on the roster. Three of those players were just called up from the junior varsity team.

Ed Marsteiner has been a three-point threat all season long for the Saints, and Pat Mooney, Jim McDermott, and Todd Hardy are all capable of scoring.

The Saints must win in a tough bracket, however, and they could face top-seeded Prattsburg (18-2) in the semifinals.

DeSales was scheduled to begin sectional play Feb. 20 against No. 13 Canesaraga (7-12) at Naples.

During the last week of regular-season

play in the City-Catholic League, Aquinas (15-5) tuned up for sectional play with a 58-49 win over host Bishop Kearney (8-11) on Feb. 13.

The two Catholic schools could meet again in the finals of Class BB, where Aquinas earned a third seed and Kearney was seeded ninth.

But a few roadblocks stand in the way. The Little Irish (15-5), who are led by last year's Section 5 BB tournament MVP Alcindor Coleman, find themselves in the same bracket as second-seeded Newark (18-2) — a possible semifinal-round opponent.

First, however, Aquinas must get by 14th-seeded Wayne (6-14) in an openinground game scheduled for Feb. 20 at Webster. If the Little Irish advance to the

second round Feb. 23, they will face the winner of the game between No. 6 Greece Arcadia (12-8) and 11th-seeded Batavia (7-13).

Aquinas has been playing well of late and - except for some bumps and bruises sustained in a physical game against Kearney — is in good shape physically.

Kearney also has been playing well lately, but it has the misfortune of competing in the same bracket as top-seeded Pittsford Mendon (18-2). If the Kings advance to the quarterfinals, they will have to play Mendon.

In first-round play, Kearney is scheduled to play eighth-seeded Brighton (10-10) Feb. 20 at Greece Athena. The Kings have balanced scoring and a tenacious defense that gives opponents headaches.

But Kearney is also prone to making turnovers and fouling too often. If the Kings can keep the games close, however, they have a chance to pull some upsets.

If McQuaid (16-4) gets to the Class A finals, it might be considered an upset of sorts. Barring any mishaps along the way, the fourth-seeded Knights will have to eventually play top-seeded East (18-2) in the semifinals Feb. 28.

The two City-Catholic League foes splitthis year, with McQuaid winning 77-59 at home in December, and losing 81-79 at East on Feb. 14 in the regular-season finale for both squads.

Mercy's chances to successfully defend its Class A crown will depend on how well Cleary and White are able to play.

Mercy's lone loss of the season came Feb. 13 while Cleary was out of action and White was limited because of her injury. Visiting Aquinas capitalized on the Monarchs' handicap, winning 68-56.

The other top seeds in Class A are Fairport (second-seeded), Brockport (third), and Greece Athena (fourth).

The Monarchs have already beaten Fairport twice in close contests. They also nipped Brockport, 62-58, in the finals of

Aquinas (13-7) didn't have long to savor its win over Mercy. On Feb. 16 they fell to Pittsford Mendon 44-35 in the first round of the Webster Tournament. The Little Irish rebounded from the loss the following night by beating Greece Olympia 45-31 in the consolation round.

The Irish may have to face Mendon again in the semifinals of the Class BB tournament, as fourth-seeded Aquinas is in the same bracket as top-seeded Mendon.
