

ROCHESTER — St. Thomas More's religious education office is offering a four-part series entitled "Facing our powerlessness, embracing our freedom." The series' topics will be presented in the school multi-purpose room from 7:30-9 p.m. on the following Mondays:

March 5 — "Accepting our powerlessness, surrendering to hope;" March 12 — "Naming our strengths, celebrating our hope;"

March 19 — "Confronting our resistance, transferring our fears;" and March 26 — "Discovering our child, nurturing ourselves."

The series presenter, Craig N. Bullock, has been a psychotherapist since 1983. He specializes in marriage counseling, chemical dependency and adjustment issues. He is also a part-time psychology instructor at Geneseo Community College, and he has conducted many workshops and seminars on chemical dependency, codependency, self-esteem, family life, spirituality and sexuality throughout the northeastern and southern United States.

Father Stroik will give a talk on the relationships between teens and parents when pressured by substance abuse. The speech will take place in the auditorium of Corning-Painted Post East High School at 3 p.m. on Sunday, March 11.

Father Stroik began his career at Convenant House as a child care worker. His present position as director of pastoral ministry deals with the spiritual aspect of the work of the nationally famous New York shelter for runaway teenagers.

The lecture is open to the public. Donations for Covenant House will be taken after the lecture. Father Stroik will also preach at all weekend Masses at Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish on March 10-11.


Holy Cross Parish hosts faith enrichment course
