

Evangelists to lead week of renewal at Tier church

WATKINS GLEN — A team of Catholic evangelists will lead a four-night Parish Mission for parishioners of St. Mary's of the Lake and St. Benedict's Church, beginning Monday, March 19, at 7:30 p.m.

The mission will take place at St. Mary's of the Lake Church, 905 Decatur St. In addition, a special Teen Mission Night will take place Sunday, March 18, at 6 p.m.

The leaders of the program will be Father Ben Markwell and Sister Gemma Fenbert. Father Markwell, a member of the Capuchin-Franciscan order, has led many retreats for religious, married couples and high school students. Among his other ministerial experiences, he has served in the Middle East and Guam.

Sister Fenbert is a Tiffin Franciscan serving in the Toledo diocese as the associate director of the Office of Spiritual and Pastoral Services. She is also associate director for Toledo's diocesan synod.

According to Father David Bonin, pastor, the mission is designed to continue after the team is gone. A six-week program titled "Coming Alive in Faith" will be offered as a follow-up to the mission on Sundays from April 1 to May 20 (with the exception of May 13 and April 15).

Parish begins project to expand building

WEBSTER – St. Paul's Parish has initiated a fundraising campaign to finance expansion of its building space from its current 11,000 square feet to 22,000 square feet.

The parish plans to expand its building to the south and west of the current structure, which holds up to 475 people for worship. The expanded structure will hold 600 people at services and contain-nine dedicated classrooms, and include nursery and library space.

The parish hopes to raise \$750,000 of the \$1 million needed to expand its building through door-to-door solicitation of parishioners, according to Don Schaeffer, a member of the parish building committee. The remaining monies needed will be drawn from a \$100,000 savings account and mortgage loans, said Father Raymond Booth, pastor. -
