similar fiscal problems, we can not wait for actions from government to increase payment to hospitals."

According to John J. Renz, vice president for planning and marketing, the hospital experienced a deficit of approximately \$1.1 million in 1988, which marked an improvement over the \$3.43 million deficit recorded in 1987.

During the past four months, St. Joseph's Hospital engaged consultants familiar with hospital operations throughout New York state and the nation to recommend changes.

Dr. James Frisk, St. Joseph's vice president of medical affairs, said "the care that physicians and staff at St. Joseph's provide to patients throughout the 10-county region will continue to be the best available in our area."

Sister Castagnaro agreed that the layoff will not affect the quality of care at the

"We reviewed our staffing plans with senior officials in the State Health Department," she said. "The health department is confident the staffing levels in patient care areas will maintain the hospital's quality of care."

She added that "for the physicians and staff of St. Joseph's, our challenge is to accept change and dedicate our energy to becoming profitable while maintaining quality.

The staff reduction comes as admissions are beginning to show a marked increase, according to the hospital president.

"In January and February, we increased our admissions over 1989 levels by approx-

imately 10 percent," Sister Castagnaro said. "With a continuation of this increase in admissions, together with this reduction in expenses, St. Joseph's will be profitable in 1990."

Earlier this month, the hospital announced that it will expand its alcoholrehabilitation unit from 15 to 20 beds. The staff reduction will not affect the move to increase services in that area.

Increased patient services in the rehabilitation unit would generate about \$337,000 in additional revenue, with most of the money coming from Blue Cross and

Medicaid reimbursement.

The Finger Lakes Health Systems Agency has approved the request, which now goes to the State Office of Health Management Systems.

The additional beds would allow St. Joseph's to provide timely care for about 90 more people a year. A significant proportion of the unit's caseload is people who are cross-addicted to alcohol and drugs, principally cocaine.

The unit had occupancy rates of 94 percent in 1988 and 97 percent in 1989.

The proposed new structure would also allow parishes and individual congregations to join GEM.

A number of details have yet to be worked out before the new structure is put in place, said the Rev. Charles Luckett, pastor of East Rochester's First Presbyterian Church and head of the restructuring task force.

Among those details would be how the organization would be financed, how membership in the assembly and the board would be determined, and the exact distribution of responsibilities between the assembly and the board.

The current president of GEM, Margery Nurnberg — who also serves as director of the Department of Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs of Rochester's Catholic diocese - said the expanded body will allow greater opportunity for dialogue, cooperative social ministry, and joint worship among the represented groups.

"We need all three for true ecumenism," Nurnberg said.
