**Saints, Kings continue streaks**

ROCHESTER — As the high school baseball season enters its second half, the DeSales express continues to roll over the opposition, while the upstart Bishop Kearney Kings look to continue an impressive winning streak.

Meanwhile, Aquinas and McQuaid continued to struggle, and Elmira Notre Dame pulled out two more close wins.

The Saints (6-0, 7-0) entered their May 3 contest against host Red Jacket (4-2, 4-4) knowing that — against R-J hurler Rich Vienna — they would face one of the best pitchers in the Finger Lakes West League. Vienna was coming off a no-hit effort against South Seneca on April 27.

But DeSales, which boasts two of the league's best pitchers, countered with Frank Pane Jr. His five-hit, seven-strikeout, complete game highlighted a 5-0 win by the Saints.

Vienna, meanwhile, was victimized by nine DeSales hits. The key hits came in the fifth inning with DeSales clinging to a 1-0 lead. After the Saints loaded the bases, Paul Priebe singled to drive in one run, and Todd Hardy lashed a line-drive single to bring home two more runs.

Earlier in the week, DeSales' other ace, Jim Vedora, pitched a gem of his own.

Vedora tossed a no-hitter to stifle visiting South Seneca 22-0 on April 30. South Seneca was no-hit by R-J's Vienna in its previous game.

Vedora struck out 11 batters and didn't allow any walks during DeSales' 22-0 win.

The Saints' offense, on the other hand, combined 12 hits and 11 walks, with Pane collecting two singles and a double to drive in five runs and Jeff Taney accounting for two singles, a double, and three RBI.

Coach Frank Pane Sr. has come to expect fine pitching performances. What pleased him during the past week was his team's hitting.

If the Saints — who have outscored the opposition by a combined margin of 109-19 over seven games — are just starting to hit, league and sectional opponents are in for some long afternoons in the coming weeks.

Bishop Kearney (6-5) earned its sixth-consecutive win last week, beating host Marshall 9-5 on May 3. Brian Sergeant ripped two triples, and scored three runs.

And on May 1, the visiting Kings downed City-Catholic League-rival Aquinas 6-1. Kearney pitchers limited the Irish to just two hits. During a three-run third inning, the Kings' Brian Gesell rapped a triple and drove in a run, and Scott Delgatti came through with an RBI single.

The Kings were scheduled to travel to Rush-Henrietta for a non-league contest on May 7, before visiting Edison May 8.

Aquinas (2-2, 3-9), continued to struggle at both the plate and the mound, as the Little Irish lost all three of their contests last week.

On May 3, the Irish fell to league-leading East 11-7.

After taking a 3-0 lead in the top of the first inning, Aquinas watched the Orientals answer with four runs in the bottom of the inning to take a lead they would never relinquish.

Prior to losing to Kearney on May 1, the Irish lost a 6-3 non-league decision to visiting Penfield. Aquinas' batters managed only five hits in the game.

McQuaid (2-2, 3-7) continues to be plagued by errors. The Knights gave host Brockport eight unearned runs during an 11-7 loss May 3.

McQuaid took an early 5-3 lead before falling behind 6-5. The Knights eventually tied the game, 6-6, in the fifth inning. But Brockport went on to outscore McQuaid 5-2 the rest of the way.

Against visiting Wilson (1-4) May 2, McQuaid used a three-run home run by Matt Palmisano in a seven-run second inning to put together an 11-1 victory.

In addition, visiting Marshall (1-2, 2-5) edged McQuaid, 8-7, on April 30.

One positive note for the Knights is that pitching ace Andy Dvonch, who has been sidelined with a shoulder injury, threw a few innings during the week and is expected to return to the rotation.

In Section 4 Class C play, Elmira Notre Dame players might want to consider buying their coach some Grecian Formula. The Crusaders (4-1, 7-3) have developed a habit of winning games in the late innings, prompting coach John Cain to joke, "I'm getting gray hairs."

On May 2, Brian Granger ripped a two-run double in the top of the seventh inning to give the Crusaders the lead in a 6-5 win over host Corning West. Granger went 2-for-3 (two doubles) in the game. Mike Bennett went 3-for-3.

Bennett pitched during a 2-1 win in eight innings over league-rival Southside at Dunn Field on April 30.

The Crusaders managed only five hits in the game — one of them a fourth inning home run by Bennett to tie the game at 1-1. The game was decided when Southside committed three errors in the eighth inning.

Blake Pierce reached second on a two-base error. He advanced to third on a ground out to short, then scored on an error when the Southside catcher dropped a pop-up by Brian Sheehan.

Jon Hand had the hot hand for Kearney, firing home four goals. Greg Phillips accounted for the other two Kearney goals.

For the game, Fairport outshot Kearney 36-19.

On April 30, Phillips collected four goals to lead the Kings to a 9-6 win over host Pittsford. Hand had two goals and four assists in the non-league contest.

In addition to the game against McQuaid on May 8, Kearney was scheduled to host Williamsville May 11 and Rush-Henrietta May 12.
