On Tuesday, May 22, the Diocese of Rochester will celebrate the 25th, 50th and 60th anniversaries of ordination of 16 diocesan priests. The jubilee celebration will take place at St. Mary's Church, 15 State St., Corning, beginning at 11 a.m.

Bishop Matthew H. Clark will be the principal celebrant at the liturgy of the Eucharist. Following the liturgy, a luncheon for the clergy will be served in the hall of All Saints Academy.

The Class of 1930

Father Joseph M. McDonnell had already been a priest for more than 25 years when the Second Vatican Council opened the Catholic Church's windows and turned parish life upside down.

'Yet, as pastor of St. Michael's Church, Newark, from 1957-75, Father McDonnell built a strong legacy in the face of nearconstant change, winning "the respect and admiration of young, old and middle-aged alike," recalled parishioner and friend Ray

Michael's business manager, joined the Newark parish in 1957, the same year in which

Southern Tier in 1972 presented Father Joseph F. Hogan with his most memorable challenge as a pastor.

Assigned to St. Vincent de Paul Church, Corning, from 1964-73, he faced the task of putting the parish buildings back together, a burden he said was eased by the way parishioners and neighbors came together and demonstrated their concern for one another.

A native of Waverly, Father Hogan attended Waverly High School and graduated from diocesan seminaries. Among his parish assignments were: St. Mary's, Watkins Glen; St. Patrick's, Elmira; and St. Patrick's, Owego. From 1955-61, he served Notre Dame High School as chaplain.

Father Hogan returned to Notre Dame to live at the convent upon his retirement in

For 19 of his 50 years as a priest, Father Alfred J. Horr was

pastor of St. Mary Magdalen, Wolcott, where he continues to serve pastor as emeritus.

An alumnus of St. Patrick's School, Mt. Morris, and Mt. Morris High School, Father Horr graduated

from diocesan seminaries. Prior to his assignment in Wolcott, he served at St. Mary's, Elmira, and Holy Family, Auburn, for 10 years respectively, as well as at St. Mary's, Corning, and St. John's, Spen-

Since retiring in 1986 from the pastorate

of St. Gregory Church, Marion, Father John A. Morgan has spent winters assisting at Sacred Heart Parish in Pinehurst, N.C., and summers filling in for priests throughout the Rochester diocese.

A native of Auburn, Father Morgan moved

to Rochester while still in elementary school, attending St. Ambrose School, as well as St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's

Among the parishes in which he served were: Blessed Sacrament, 1940-51; St. Bernard's, Scipio Center, 1964-67; St. James, Waverly, 1967-78; and St. Columba, Caledonia, 1978-81.

From Caledonia, Father Morgan moved to St. Gregory's, where he served as pastor for five years.

Father John A. Murphy spent 22 years

as pastor of St. Lawrence Parish, Rochester, concluding with his retirement in 1984.

Prior to 1962, he spent a decade as chaplain at what has become Craig Developmental Center but was then known as Sonyea's Craig Colony for Epileptics.

The Geneva native and DeSales High School alumnus also undertook assignments at St. Philip Neri, Rochester, and St. Patrick's, Elmira.

He currently resides at St. Vincent de Paul Church, Corning.

Since formally retiring in 1984, Father Bartholomew J. O'Brien has traveled

throughout the diocese in answer to more than 100 invitations to offer retreats and parish missions.

Horseheads remains Father O'Brien's home, he no although longer resides at St. Mary Our Mother Church, where he served as pastor from 1965-84.

Earlier, he was assigned to Ss. Peter and Paul, Elmira — where he was both an assistant, 1951-62, and pastor, 1962-65 — and to St. Patrick's, Rochester, from 1941-51.

In 1961, Bishop Kearney appointed Father O'Brien diocesan director of the Sacerdotal Union and its lay branch, the Eucharistic Legion. Six years later, Bishop Fulton J. Sheen named the Waverly native vicar for the Corning-Elmira-Waverly area.

Throughout his years as a priest, Father O'Brien has also written numerous articles and books focusing on spiritual life.

The longtime pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Rochester, and former rector of St. Andrew's Seminary, Monsignor Richard M. Quinn now resides at St. Thomas the Apostle Church, Irondequoit.

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Born July 26, 1914, to Theobald and Helen Schutte Quinn, he attended Immaculate Conception School and Aquinas Institute, during which time he lived with his aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Quinn.

Monsignor Quinn received his religious training at St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's seminaries, and went on to obtain his master's degree from Canisius College in Buffalo. He completed advanced studies at Columbia University and the University of

Following his ordination in 1940, Monsignor Quinn served as assistant pastor of several parishes in New Jersey. He was later named assistant pastor of Holy Cross Church, Rochester, where he served from 1943 to 1945.

Monsignor Quinn was a professor at St. Andrew's Seminary, and was rector of the seminary until 1967, when he was named pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help.

He was named papal chamberlain, with the title very reverend monsignor, by Pope John XXIII in 1959, and domestic prelate with the title right reverend monsignor in 1966.

He retired as pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help in 1985.

Father Albert J. Shamon had a long career in the field of religious education. Born April 3, 1915, to Charles and Victoria Mahfoud Shamon in Auburn, he attended St. Aloysius and Au-

burn Academic High School and St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's seminaries. He earned his master's degree in history from Canisius College, Buffalo, and furthered his studies at Glenn Ellyn and Maryknoll House of Studies, Chicago.

Father Shamon's first assignment was as assistant pastor of St. Thomas the Apostle Church, where he served until 1944. He taught at Aquinas Institute from 1945 until 1950, and was a lecturer on dogmatic and mystical theology from 1949 to 1963, during which time he was appointed pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Victor (1961). He was elevated to the post of episcopal vicar for Religious Education for the Diocese of Rochester by Bishop Sheen in April, 1967, and vicar of education.

Father Shamon served as pastor of St. Patrick's Church until 1970 and in the education office until 1973. He was later pastor of St. Mary's, Waterloo, from 1973 until he retired in 1985.

In addition to being a regular columnist for the Catholic Courier. Father Shamon has written several books, including First Steps to Sanctity (1958), a layman's guide to a holy life; Behind the Mass (1950); Catching Up on Catechetics (1972); and Treasure Untold (1955).

Born and raised in Rochester, Father Hayes studied at St.
