

Former Clyde parishioner joins order in Steubenville

Sister Judanne Knapp, formerly Judith Lee Knapp of St. John's Parish in Clyde, made her first profession of vows as a religious sister on August 11, entering the



Franciscan Sisters, TOR, of Penance of the Sorrowful Mother.

The daughter of Llyad Herbert and Jean Inez Knapp, Sister Judanne and three other novices professed their vows before Bishop Albert Ottenweller of the Diocese of Steubenville, Ohio, in a ceremony at Christ the King Chapel on the campus of Franciscan University of Steubenville.

After entering the new order a little more than two years ago, Sister Judanne spent a year in postulancy before receiving her habit as a novice. She then spent 14 months in solitude, prayer and study.

"I have chosen to become a bride of Christ because of the great love that I have for him in my heart," Sister Judanne said. "I desire to serve Him and His church by living a vowed, consecrated life.'

Franciscan Sisters, TOR, of Penance of the Sorrowful Mother is an order in formation, established just over two years ago. It is directly affiliated with Franciscan University of Steubenville, and plans are underway to build a convent on campus.

The new community is especially devoted to the Eucharist and the Blessed Virgin Mary.


