Crusaders cruising

With a perfect 6-0 record so far, the Lady Crusaders of Notre Dame are on a roll. Notre Dame started its season on Aug. 31, beating visiting Dryden 5-1 in the annual Lady Crusaders Soccer Invitational. Striker Jenny Fagan accounted for three of ND's goals. Claire Ramich and Christina Brunner each scored once.

The Crusaders cruised to a 3-0 win over Campbell in the tourney's championship game on Sept. 1. Fagan, Melanie Crisco and Lori Spaziani each tallied a goal for ND. Goalie Erin Kernan earned the shutout as Notre Dame outshot the Red Jackets, 47-1. Fagan was named MVP of the tournament.

In their first game outside of tournament action, the Lady Crusaders routed Addison 6-2 on Sept. 4. Ramich, a center-halfback, had two goals, and Megan Barbier, Crisco and Fagan each had one.

Spaziani scored two goals, and Fagan and Crisco each had one in ND's 4-1 triumph over Bath on Sept. 6. In yet another romp on Sept. 13, the Lady Crusaders outshot Corning 42-5 en route to a 6-0 win. Fagan kicked in three goals, Ramich put in two and Lisa Beaty joined the scorers by tallying one. Goalie Becky Sherman kept Corning off the scoreboard.

In a close match on Sept. 15, Notre Dame had to come from behind in a 2-1 win against visiting Hammondsport. The Lakers scored first in jumping out to a 1-0 lead at the half. But Fagan and Brunner both scored in the second half to keep ND's record unblemished.

Although coach Steve Weber said he was pleased with his team's progress thus far, he said the tough part of its league schedule would start against Elmira Free Academy on Sept. 18.

With 45 seconds left in regulation time, sophomore wing Mimi LaMagna scored to tie the game, 1-1. Doyle's fifth goal in three games came in the overtime session to win the match for Mercy. Goalie Lennox had eight saves.

Next up for Mercy was Webster on Sept. 11. LaMagna scored on a head shot off of a corner kick by senior wing Julie Sasso to give Mercy a 1-0 at the half. Doyle added another goal during second-half play to secure the 2-0 win. Lennox was spectacular in the goal for Mercy, turning away 18 shots.
