

Her theme for the celebration is "Truly You have formed my inmost being" (Psalm 139, verse 13).



Sister Bringley, 33, coordinates the After Care Program at Melita House, 124 Evergreen St. As part of her work Melita House, she maintains contact with former guests after they have left the residence for unwed expectant mothers. She also provides numerous support services for former guests.

A 1975 graduate of Cardinal Mooney High School, Sister Bringley received an associate's degree in special education from Mohawk Valley Community College in Utica in 1977. She earned a bachelor of science degree in education from the State University of New York College at Geneseo two years later, and a master's degree in theology and pastoral counseling from St. Bernard's Institute this past May.

Sister Bringley entered the Sisters of Mercy in 1981 and professed her first vows in 1984. She now lives with the order's North Street community.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Bringley of St. Charles Borromeo Parish in Greece, Sister Bringley is one of eight children.

AUBURN — The Christopher Columbus Commemorative Committee has named Father Patrick Seelman, OFM, its Man of the Year.


Father Seelman, pastor of St. Francis of Assisi Church, will be honored at a dinner scheduled for Oct. 7, at 5 p.m. in the Holiday Inn

A Utica native, Father Seelman was ordained in 1963. After serving in a number of parishes in New York, Pennsylvania and Minnesota, as well as the Franciscan Mission in Paraguay, he was named pastor of the Auburn parish in 1985.

While serving as pastor in Auburn, Father Seelman has been credited with rejuvenating the parish, noted Mary Pisciotti, treasurer of the Christopher Columbus Committee.

"He has put new life into the parish community," Pisciotti said. Father Seelman, she added, became actively involved in a number of the parish groups and societies. "He's gotten everyone together," she said.

In addition, Father Seelman spearheaded the renovation of the parish's physical plant, noted Francis Pisciotti, Mary's husband and president of the Christopher Columbus Committee. The priest arranged for the installation of new doors and a canopy for the church. In addition, he had

"We've got people from all across the country who stop by to see the shrine," Francis Pisciotti said.
