Portrait of the director makes for tedious film

NEW YORK (CNS) — Clint Eastwood re-creates the fact-based story of director John Huston's hunting obsession while preparing to film "The African Queen," in"White Hunter, Black Heart" (Warner Bros.).

Flamboyant and debt-ridden director John Wilson (Eastwood) agrees to shoot a film in Africa not only to avoid financial ruin, but also to get in some big-game hunting.

He persuades his friend Pete (Jeff Fahey) to accompany him and collaborate on the screenplay. Once there, however, Wilson refuses to focus on anything but the prospect of bagging a huge male elephant or as he puts it, "a big tusker."

When Pete, exasperated by Wilson's egotistical and irresponsible behavior, suggests it's a crime to kill such a rare animal, Wilson arrogantly explains, "It's more than a crime — it's a sin — and that's why I want to do it."

Fed up with Wilson's obsession, Pete is ready to pack it in when the worried producer (George Dzundza) and cast arrive, expecting to begin their shoot. Playing the consummate host, Wilson attempts to charm them at a welcoming dinner, but next morning he sets off on safari.

Only his final, tragic confrontation with the targeted elephant forces the director to reconsider the enormity of his ego and open his eyes to the business at hand.

Considering the near-legendary reputation of the real-life director as a man of immense passion, producer, star and director Eastwood has created a curiously uninvolving film.

His pointed imitation of Huston's distinctive vocal mannerisms is unnerving and prevents one from appreciating Eastwood's self-assured performance. It doesn't help either that this central character is so unappealing. Several scenes are reduced to talking heads, including those in which the Wilson character pulverizes everyone in sight with sharply barbed insults.

The film's main problem is its wafer-thin story - man wants to shoot elephant, not movie. Since Wilson doesn't care about shooting his film, viewers may ultimately feel just as blase about watching his story.

The authentic Zimbabwe landscapes and wildlife are outstanding, however. Also, Dzundza captures the stereotype of the blustery movie producer while managing to give the role some bite.

This unflattering portrait of an utterly selfish individual may be psychologically intriguing, but it is rarely entertaining.
