DeSales set for sectionals; ND bowl-bound

Elmira Notre Dame is headed for a bowl game and Geneva DeSales cruised into sectionals after both diocesan teams rolled to wins Nov. 2-3.

Meanwhile, Aquinas Institute crushed Franklin but it wasn't enough to earn the Little Irish a sectional berth.

McQuaid Jesuit and Bishop Kearney closed out the season with losses.

Notre Dame (8-1) squashed host Waverly (0-9), 40-7, on Nov. 2.

Geoff Woodworth and Pat Palmer teamed up to score ND's first 14 points. First, Woodworth rumbled 11 yards for a touchdown, and Palmer added the pointafter to give ND a 7-0 lead.

On the Crusaders' next possession, Woodworth raced 34 yards into the end zone for a score and Palmer booted the PAT to increase the margin to 14-0.

In the second quarter, Mike Bennett sprinted for 44 yards for a touchdown to increase the margin to 20-0. Palmer's kick increased the cushion to 21-0.

Later in the quarter, Rich O'Kane scored on a 13-yard interception return. Palmer's PAT failed, however, keeping the score

The half ended 34-0 after a three-yard TD run by Woodworth and another Palmer extra-point kick.

On the opening kickoff of the third quarter, Palmer continued the scoring ambush as he blazed 87-yards for the score. Palmer's kick was blocked, but it didn't matter as ND enjoyed a 40-0 lead.

With three minutes left in the game, Wolverines' quarterback Mike Collins snuck into the endzone on a two-yard run, and Sean Sutton added the PAT to close out the scoring.

Woodworth finished with eight carries for 96 yards and three touchdowns. Bennett had 10 carries for 88 yards and one touchdown — all in the first half.

The Crusaders will host Binghamton Seton Catholic in the Section 4 bowl game on Nov. 9 at 7:30 p.m. D'Aloisio said his players are looking to redeem themselves for last year's bowl-game loss to Chenango Valley, 20-7.

In Section 5 grid action, Geneva DeSales (7-1) blanked Romulus, 36-0, at home on Nov. 3. The win clinched a three-way tie for the Finger Lakes West championship between DeSales, Clyde-Savannah and Lyons.

The Saints earned their first three points in the first quarter on a 27-yard field goal by John O'Neil.

In the second quarter, Chris Lamson gathered in a nine-vard touchdown pass from Frank Pane Jr. O'Neil added the extra point for a 10-0 Saints' lead.

The same two players teamed up again minutes later when Lamson scored on a 28yard pass from Pane. O'Neil booted another extra-point, increasing the margin to 17-0 at intermission.


Bishop Kearney suffered through its final game of the season with a 20-0 drubbing by Marshall on Nov. 3.
