He will also give his players more freedom on offense. "If they are open for the shot, I want them to take it," D'Aloisio said. "If not, I want them to give it to someone closer.'

Against stiff competition in the Sullivan Trail Conference, ND will not see any breathers this winter. Traditionally strong programs such as Trumansburg, Hornell and Horseheads loom for ND. But D'Aloisio said that tough competition only helps his team come sectional time.
