East holds off McQuaid; Notre Dame still perfect



"You're not going to see a better game than this," remarked a McQuaid fan who attended the Dec. 14 City-Catholic League basketball game between the Knights and East.

He's probably right.

The two rivals played a furious-paced game before a sold out crowd at East High School on Friday afternoon. McQuaid supporters walked away disappointed as East rallied for a 72-69 win over the Knights.

The Orientals (5-0) carried the play early, leading 24-18 at the end of the first quarter and 37-36 at the half. East maintained its lead by combining a strong tran-

sition game and by taking advantage of several McQuaid turnovers.

McQuaid (4-1) finally grabbed the lead in the third quarter. Then with 10 seconds left in the stanza, Ted Naylon broke away from a crowd of players, ran the entire length of the court and scored a basket to give the Knights a 54-50 lead heading into the final eight minutes.

The two rivals were neck and neck in the fourth quarter as the game came down to the final minutes. At the 3:26 mark,

baskets to grab a 68-64 lead. Naylon then missed the front half of a one-and-one, allowing East to come up with a key rebound down the stretch.

Mike Montesano's two foul shots with 12 seconds left pulled McQuaid to within 70-66, but the Orientals scored again to make the score 72-66. With three seconds left in the game, Montesano sank a threepointer but time wasn't on the Knights' side as the clock ran out.

Although McQuaid Coach Joe Marchese said he was disappointed with the way his team squandered the lead down the stretch, he said his players had nothing to be ashamed of in losing to a talented East team by just three points.

Montesano paced the Knights with 21 points, Jason McKinney - who dominated underneath but missed several key outside shots - poured in 20 points (including 8for-8 from the foul line), and Naylon finished with 11. McKinney led McOuaid with 12 rebounds, followed by Jeff Reese with 11.

On Dec. 11, McQ routed host Marshall, 89-61, spurred by what Marchese called the best quarter in the history of McQuaid basketball.

Paced by Montesano's 18 points and Naylon's 13 points, the Knights poured in 39 points to the Jurists' 15 in the third quarter alone.

"We blew the game open," said Marchese.

Naylon led the Knights in scoring with 27 points, while Montesano tallied 25 points and McKinney poured in 21.

McQuaid recorded earlier City-Catholic League wins at home against Edison, 79-63, on Dec. 7, and Wilson, 84-62, on Dec. 4.

In other City-Catholic League games last week, Aquinas Institute (3-2) whipped host Bishop Kearney, 55-43, on Dec. 14.

The game was close until the fourth quarter. Kearney led the game 37-33 at the end of the third, but a strong Little Irish rally over the final eight minutes propelled AQ to the league win. Jeff Rice and Chris Valentino paced the AQ offense in the fourth quarter.

For the game, Aquinas' Jason Newton collected 14 points and eight rebounds. Aaron Boucher scored 14 points and Valentino tallied 12. Rice added eight points and three rebounds, and Rick Bardwell finished with seven rebounds and two points.

Dianetti credited his reserves for playing well after coming off the bench - especially after Boucher fouled out in the final

Jason Carter paced the Quakers with 19 points. Aquinas' Boucher tallied 15 and Newton poured in 11 points.

Newton (20 points, 10 rebounds) and Boucher (15 points) propelled the Little Irish to a 66-46 win over host Bishop Cunningham (Section 3) on Dec. 5.

In addition to experiencing a scoring drought in the game against Aquinas, Bishop Kearney (2-3) fell to host Greece-Athena, 82-69, on Dec. 11.

The non-league ballgame was close throughout, with Athena leading 36-30 at the half. The Kings couldn't stop Athena's John Wallace, who scored 33 points - including 13 in a pivotal fourth quarter.

Kevin Pawlak poured in 25 points for BK. Kelly Ryan iced 18 points and Joe Raniewicz tallied 16.

The Kings handed host Wilson a 70-55 loss on Dec. 7.

In Class D action last week, Geneva DeSales (5-1) was plagued by foul troubles as the visiting Saints were clobbered by Honeoye's Cougars, 88-55, in a Finger Lakes West game on Dec. 14.

Due to a rash of injuries, the Saints came into the game with just seven healthy players. Things got worse when Bob McFadden and Ed Marsteiner both fouled out in the fourth quarter, leaving DeSales with just five eligible players.

McFadden finished with a game-high 31 points before he fouled out of the game.

In a Dec. 12 Finger Lakes West game at Red Jacket, the Saints secured a 70-50 victory.

The Saints were never challenged in the
